Memorandum:DIRECTOR, SURVEYS & ENGINEERING BRANCHRe: Indian Residential School, Shubenacadie, N.S.Reference your I.A. 1156-4-2 of June 13th.

We have read your memorandum containing the report submitted by Mr. Hargreaves on the domestic hot and cold water system at the above school. It has been noted that a complete new layout will be required at a cost of approximately \$6,500.

Included in our 1947-48 estimates is the following item,-

"Shubenacadie Residential School - Renew Heating and Plumbing System - \$8,000."

This amount was included upon receipt of your memorandum of similar file of November 20th. Therefore, it will be in order for you to carry out the repairs as required.

However, as you have been already informed, this will leave only \$1,500. to carry out the work required at this school to prevent water infiltration, (see your memorandum of March 21st)

It is presumed that the replacement of the domestic system is of more immediate importance than the work on the brick at this school.

The Sister Superior of the Indian Residential School, Shubenacadie, N. S., has requested that an electric food chopper be supplied for the School kitchen, as she feels that it would be a great saving in utilizing small scraps of meat, vegetables, Etc.

I wrote Toledo Scale Co., Halifax, N. S., regarding one of these food choppers, respecting which you will find letter and cut attached. The price of \$310.00 seems to be an exorbitant price for one of these items. No doubt you could contact some other firm who would have a machine that would do the same job and at a much smaller initial cost.

In the past they have been using a hand grinder which could not begin to do the work with a 165 children to be fed. I feel that if at all possible this machine should be bought and receive your favourable consideration.

It is understood that it will now not be possible to proceed with the work required at this school to prevent water infiltration, as specified in your memorandum of March 21, because of the lateness of the season and the shortage of cement.

Therefore, we feel that our original plan of renewing the heating and plumbing system at this school should be carried out, in accordance with Mr. Mills' memorandum of June 13.

As soon as you are able to obtain tenders for this work, could we please be advised so that we can raise the necessary encumbrance certificate in your favour.

Repairs to Shubenacadie Residential School

To carry out a reconditioning and waterproofing job on the brick walls of the above school, we are faced with two alternatives:

- (a) To do a temporary waterproofing of the walls by applying special preparation at a cost of approximately \$8,000.00;
- (b) To do a permanent waterproofing of the walls by applying a concrete layer over the whole building at a cost of approximately \$17,000.00.

Upon the recommendation of our Surveys and Engineering Branch and because of the lateness of the season and our lack of funds, it has been decided to adopt course (b) early next Spring. This sum will be included in the estimates which we will submit to the Minister's office for the 1948-49 fiscal year.

We have already requested the Surveys and Engineering Branch, therefore, to proceed with the other repair job required at the above school, namely, the repairs to the heating system. Mr. Ross should shortly be hearing from his head office regarding these repairs. It would be appreciated if you could keep us informed as to when these repairs begin and the progress made by the plumbers in carrying out the contract.

Dear Reverend Father:

I have per acknowledgement your letter of October 2,
in which you ask the cost per bushel of potatoes, which I
wish to ship for your school.

I did not know what the cost would be, as I thought
arrangements had been made, or would be made at Ottawa regarding
this. Potatoes, in this area at the present time are selling
to shippers at \$2.25 per barrel, which would be .75¢ per bushel.
You state, you may not need 400 bushels, but I am afraid I would
not be able to spare that many anyway. Part of my potato field
was damp, and the crop there was not as good as expected. I
could, however, spare you 275 or 300 bushels, but the freight
on these would be very high, as they would weigh much less, than
the minimum weight of freight for a car.

May I hear from you further regarding this.

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
