

AGENT'S REPORT ON WEST COAST AGENCY FOR OCTOBER.

Alberni residential school is still in the process of adjustment, but is rapidly being put in order. The children are all well clothed and fed, and appear to be very happy. Meals are very good and well prepared. The cups and dishes however are not good, being enamel ware and badly chipped and difficult to sterilize. The laundry was in operation at time of inspection, and appeared to be running satisfactorily. Grounds and classroom were in good order, as were the dormitories, hallways and basement.

The staff appears to be very capable and considering the inevitable confusion attendant upon the opening of a new school, very good progress has been made.

As the previous visit to the school during the month, I was accompanied by the medical officer, who examined all pupils admitted from West Coast points. Dr Jones also inspected the school, and was well satisfied.

The boilers and heating plant were also inspected during the month by the boiler inspector, Mr. Arnall.



With reference to your memorandum of the 17th instant in connection with a fire alarm system at the above, I may say that no fire alarm equipment was included in the contract for the school.

It was understood by our architect that this item was to have been included with other equipment which the Indian Affairs Branch undertook to furnish for the school.

In this connection I may say that, in a telephone discussion on the matter yesterday, our architect was advised by Mr. Phelan of the Training Division, Indian Affairs Branch, that funds provided for equipment at the school have not been exhausted, and that they are prepared to obtain estimates and arrange for the purchase of whatever fire alarm equipment may be required to comply with Provincial regulations through Indian Commissioner D.M. MacKay in Vancouver.

I am in receipt of your letter of the 26th ultimo enclosing Captain Barry's report of his inspection of the Alberni Residential School on November 13 and 14.

It is noted that the Inspector complains of the fact that fire escapes were not provided in the main building.

I am advised by the Architect of the Surveys & Engineering Branch that when a fireproof building has concrete stairs which are located within 75 feet of any point in the building there is no necessity for the erection of outside fire escapes.

I was under the impression that fire gongs had been installed in the main building. Apparently such is not the case and I am taking up the matter with the Surveys & Engineering Branch.
