SUPERINTENDENT OF INDIAN EDUCATION

Re: Schubencadie Indian Residential School.

The Schubencadie Residential School has an enrolment of 158 children. The junior division have 68 children in the classroom; the intermediate 35 and the senior 55. It will be necessary to operate a fourth classroom. There is space available. A room originally intended for a classroom is being used as storage and for the pottery. This room which is identical to one of the classrooms would be, after a general clean-up, very suitable. I would suggest that the principal submit estimates for the preparation of this room.

There is no workshop and no space available for one. It will be necessary to build a separate building that would serve as a workshop, (general shop and pottery) and also provide storage space. The principal should obtain estimates for a building that would supply his needs.

On his return to Ottawa, Mr. Doucet reported that the room that has formerly been used for storage purposes will be required as a classroom during the academic year 1949-50. Please let us know as soon as possible what it will cost to clean this room so that it will be suitable for classroom purposes.

If additional desks are required, you should forward a requisition. As you know, we now supply single chair desks, and these are made in three sizes, large, medium and small.

If it is possible to erect a workshop at a reasonable cost, we are hopeful of being able to secure the necessary funds. It would, therefore, be appreciated if you would make some enquiries and advise us as soon as possible the total expenditure that you consider would be necessary to provide a workshop. When replying, you should state the size of the building which you consider is necessary.

Further to previous correspondence respecting the captionally noted subject.

On Friday, August 19th, this section of the Maritimes was swept by driving rain accompanied by winds of gale force from the north and north-west. The whole northern end of the Indian Residential School not only leaked through the window casings but also through the main wall and gallons of water ran down inside on the first and second floors. In view of the unsatisfactory result obtained from water proofing which was completed last Fall, it is considered inadvisable to proceed with the interior decorating which was authorized in your letter of August 6, 1949.

It is strongly recommended that immediate steps be taken to contact the Firm of Creighan and Archibald, Montreal, P. Q. with the request that steps be taken at the earliest possible date to have the situation at the Residential School completed to the satisfaction of the parties concerned.





Attached hereto you will find the Report on Examination of Water conducted by the Nova Scotia Department of Public Health on August 23rd, 1949 which is self explanatory.

It would appear that the water contamination in "Snydes Lake" (Source of the water) has reached the point where an adequate purifier must be installed. The only purifier in the present system is a small strainer to keep eels and other fish from getting into the main line.

Could this matter be referred to the Lands and Development Services Branch please? Mr. R. R. Ross, who it is understood is now at Perth, N.B., is wholly familiar with this water system, as it was he that supervised the laying of the main water line in 1947.

It would be appreciated if this matter were treated as urgent in view of the fact all drinking water used by the Staff and Pupils must now be hauled some seven miles from the Indian Reserve.

With reference to your marginal notation dated the 26th ultimo, asking for a report on the subject matter contained in Major MacKay's memorandum to you of August 26th last, you are advised as follows:-

Indian Superintendent Rice reported early in the spring, that during violent rainstorms, moisture was still penetrating the exterior walls and the matter was drawn to the attention of Messrs Creaghan and Archibald the contractors who replied that they would endeavour to have their Halifax representative visit the building during a rainstorm, to observe and report on the condition.

Our Mr. Ross while in Nova Scotia on other work, visited the school, and reported that the waterproofing material appeared to have been carefully applied but that numerous hair-line cracks in the cement were apparent at the corners of the building and at several window openings.

On June 16th last, this information was furnished to Creaghan and Archibald at which time we requested comment, and a copy of the report supposed to have been submitted by their Halifax representative.

Having received no acknowledgment, we again wrote the contractors on August 19th last, informing them that under the terms of their contract whereby they guaranteed their work for 5 years, we expected them to investigate the unsatisfactory condition and proceed with whatever remedial measures that were necessary.

We have attempted today to talk to Messrs Creaghan and Archibald by long-distance telephone, but Mr. Archibald could not be reached. As soon as he can be contacted, you will be further advised.





Reference is made to your notation on a memorandum dated September 10th from the Director, Indian Affairs Branch, requesting that an inspection of the sanitary condition of the water supply of the above school be made at an early date.

The matter has been discussed with, Mr. J.R. Menzies, Chief, Public Health Engineering Division, National Health and Welfare Department, who has offered to have one of his field engineers stationed at Moncton, New Brunswick, make an inspection at the first opportunity. A draft letter for your signature, if satisfactory, is attached asking Mr. Menzies to carry out the examination.

It is understood from the letter sent by Superintendent Rice that the enclosed report on examination of the water by the Department of Public Health for the Province of Nova Scotia, is the most unfavourable of several such examinations that have been made. In order that a decision may be reached regarding the safety of the water, we would like to receive reports covering other samples taken recently, or, if a series of samples have not been taken it is suggested that this be done.

Our engineer Ross states that he recalls seeing two chlorinators in storage at Shubenacadie, which had been salvaged from the Mount Pleasant Airport, while making an inspection last spring. The only one of the two suitable for a small water supply has been reconditioned at the factory for installation on the Tobique Reserve in New Brunswick. It is understood a third chlorinator was salvaged by Indian Affairs at the same time from the Airport, and it is suggested that Mr. Rice be requested to locate this third unit if available for possible use at the Residential School, and let us have a description with factory numbers in case it is decided the water should be chlorinated for safety.
