4. SCHOOLS. I inspected St. George's Indian Industrial school and went all round with Rev. A.R. Lett, Principal. They are, of course, in the new building and undoubtedly it is a great relief to the Principal and staff to get there. Mr. Lett, too, hopes to have considerably more children the next term. Considerably more cupboard space will be required. They are also greatly troubled with sand getting into the house during any high winds, and will probably have to do some oiling of the boy's playground, which is to windward of the building. A storm had occurred just before I got there, and everything as covered with sand. Whilst there, I checked up certain articles and equipment that had been supplied to the school by Kamloops firms. With the exception of two articles all were satisfactory and as ordered.

Dear Mr. McLean:-

I had an opportunity of going thoroughly over the school building at Lytton. The construction is defective in several important particulars, and if the contractor's security cheque has not been returned, I would advise you to hold it. I think the Supervisor of Construction is to blame to some extent.

Mr. Dill, of the Contracting Firm, saw me in Vancouver, in company with Mr. Bater, and I was not at all impressed by the last named gentleman.

Unseasoned lumber was evidently used for the doors and interior fittings, and the result is that many of the doors have shrunk, and go right past the stop, and others are crooked and do not close. A poor job of plastering was done, and the material throughout is not first class. The cement floors in the play room are sure to give trouble later on, as they are already scaling. There are one or two points about the building that I will take up with Mr. Orr when I return to headquarters.

Mr. Dill is anxious that certain allowances should be made him, and he brought up the question of increased wages, but after seeing the building, I am not at all sympathetic with his claim, in fact I think we have a claim against him.

Dear Sir:

This letter may be regarded as a statement dealing with the glazed tile-work in kitchen and scullery of the St. George's Indian School, Lytton, B.C. which you recently completed.

Owing to a change made in this work (asked for by the Department) the amount of tile work to be done was considerably reduced, therefore it is only to be reasonably expected that a proportionate amount of money be deducted from your contract amount.

The deduction was made on account of 594 sq. ft. of glazed tile-work omitted at the rate of \$1.00 per foot amounting to Five hundred and ninety-four dollars. (\$594.00).

Against this, I have allowed Sixty-six dollars (\$66.00) for 66 sq. yds. of plaster which was put up in place of the omitted tile-work.

In the scullery, extra tile and plaster work was done at the request of the department, which was allowed for at the rate of \$1.00 per ft. for tile and \$1.00 per sq. yd. for the plaster, which further offsets your deduction, reducing it to Two hundred and sixty-two dollars. (\$262.00).

The account sent in to the Department along with the final certificate, the amount of deduction was larger owing to the fact that you were overcharged on the tile-work \$1.65 per ft. instead of \$1.00.



Dear Mr. Graham-

Re the present small building which we have been utilizing as a dairy. This is a temporary wooden structure without a flue, as it was not thought necessary to go to any great expense, for a permanent dairy would be erected *later*.

While the present building is not large enough, and the wooden floor unsanitary, this is not the real reason of the necessity of a new building. We have had no less than three fires on the roof of the present building, and the last time the roof was completely destroyed. On this occasion we had to do some fire fighting to save the barn, which had just been filled with the first crop of hay.

A permanent concrete building should be erected with brick flue doing away with the present fire hazard, and would give us a perfectly sanitary structure.

Please take this matter up with the Dept. at your earliest.

Regarding the radiation in the recreation room, I beg to say, that, as the long nights are approaching, and we are making more use of the room, it is essential that the present floor radiation, should be replaced by wall radiation.

With the radiation as it now is, there is a constant fear of the children getting severely hurt. As you know I retained the wall radiation in the old school, and the cost of the change would not be very great, and should be done before there is need for the furnace.

Depty. Sup. Gen. Scott has asked that this matter should be taken up directly with him and immediately on his return from his western tour.

Kindly take the matter up with him at your earliest.

General's visit here, I called his attention to the shortage of basement storage, and asked that we be allowed to add two small storage rooms, just off the corridor running from the childrens Dining room, past the Kitchen, on the north-west side of the building. This could readily be done at a very small cost as it would only mean the putting in of concrete for three sides with a 6" partition in the middle making access to the rooms from the corridor and the necessary roofing.

When you were inspecting the new St. George's Residential School, the want of a storeroom for fruit, potatoes, etc., and a room for peeling potatoes and vegetables, etc., was pointed out to you. We personally examined where we proposed one should be built on.

You asked us to bring this to your attention so I am now enclosing a letter from the Reverend Principal in connection with the same. This is certainly a very necessary addition as there is no place whatever for storing preserves, etc., which unless kept in some cool place are likely to ferment.

It is hard to say what this building would cost, but I strongly recommend that a uniform brick room be put up that would not be an eyesore in any shape or form to the present building.

Re . the shortage of storage for storm sash, beds and extra furnishings. We are now using up dormitory space for this purpose, which room should be liberated as soon as it is at all possible ~~for~~ to be used as sleeping quarters.

We are getting in a number of small children, and it is essential that they should be separate from the bigger ones, to the advantage of the children, as well as to the supervisors.

The plan I submitted to you some time ago, would undoubtedly be the best for storage purposes, besides working in with the De-pts, plan of technical training for the boys. The extra cost of the playroom ~~in~~ up stairs in this building would be very little, and it would relieve the present congestion in the recreation ~~in~~ the main building.

Supervision would be made easier and the children kept in constant occupation. As it is now three nights in the week the boys occupy the room and the girls the other three. With an additional playroom for the boys at a very small cost this could be obviated and would make things much easier.

I am anxious to have this placed before the Dept. at this time so that when they undertake the erection of the storage room together with the Manual training and repair rooms an addition to the four walls of six feet would do the trick and we should be well equipped.

I trust the Dept will see through this proposition and my wish materialise.



He, Mr. Lett, has now written me in connection with this, and I am herewith enclosing his letter. As we are now filling up the school with new pupils, the dormitories are required that are at present filled up with stormwindows and all sorts of extras, for which a storeroom has to be provided, besides making a recreation room for the boys, as well as workshops of different descriptions.

The approximate cost of the rough lumber required for this would be \$500.00, and I trust that you will be able to recommend this being done.

Replying to your letters of the fourth of September, with reference to the new St. George's Indian Residential School at Lytton, I beg to advise you that you may arrange for the installation of wall radiators in the gymnasium also the building of a suitable dairy.

With reference to the providing of a suitable store room for fruit and potatoes, etc. adjacent to the rear of the main building it would be impossible to authorize this work this year. Consideration will be given to this matter in next year's estimates. In the meantime I would ask you to please furnish me with a rough sketch showing the exact kind of room the Rev. Principal would recommend, and if this room is to be used for the storage of vegetables etc. I would suggest that the greater part of it be below grade level. Please let me have a sketch and recommendation at your earliest convenience.

I understand that there has been some discussion regarding bringing of hydro electric power lines into the school. I would be glad to have a full report from you on this matter.

With regard to the providing of a building to be used as a store house and recreation room, I would ask you to please submit a rough sketch showing what you propose to erect, the probable cost, and advise me if it is the intention to put the building up by day labour.

Unseasoned lumber was evidently used for the doors and interior fittings, and the result is that many of the doors have shrunk, and go right past the stop, and others are crooked and do not close. A poor job of plastering was done, and the material throughout is not first class. The cement floors in the play room are sure to give trouble later on, as they are already scaling. There are one or two points about the building that I will take up with Mr. Orr when I return to headquarters.

Mr. Dill is anxious that certain allowances should be made him, and he brought up the question of increased wages, but after seeing the building, I am not at all sympathetic with his claim, in fact I think we have a claim against him.

They agreed to this, and further agreed that this would be done in a systematic manner, and everything cleaned up and burnt after them, so as to leave the sight tidy. This work is to be carried out in the frosty weather when they cant work on their ranches.
