

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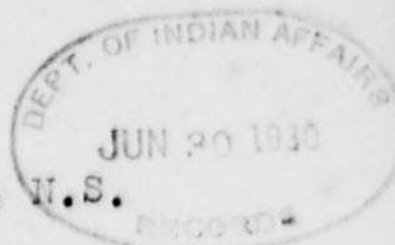

Dear Sir :

Enclosed please find the report of Dr. MacInnis, on his examination for eyes, tonsils, and hearing. We had 98 children in the School at the time of the examination, and all were examined. You will note that there are 31 for tonsils and 14 for eyes.

There has been a hint of suggestion that Dr. MacInnis and another Doctor come to the School and do the tonsils, at the fee allowed by the Dept. viz. \$ 20.00. I certainly do not want that. I think I could arrange to have this work done at the Victoria Gen. Hospital with no charge for operation but three dollars for each day there. Tonsils cases are done there on tuesdays and fridays. It means that I could take six children in by car on a Monday and six more on thursday and bring back the ones taken in on Monday, and so on till the job was complete. That should mean about \$ 12 for each child with no fee for operation. Should you decide to act on Dr. MacInnis' report I wish you would let me know before anything is decided and give me an opportunity to see if the above could be carried out.

The Department has received your letter of June 23th referring to results of examination of the pupils by Doctor MacInnis. With regard to the tonsil work I have to suggest that the matter receive some further consideration. In the first place transportation of the children to and from Halifax will not be without difficulty, and in the second place, you are taking the patients out of the hands of Doctor MacInnis, our local medical officer. You depend upon him for the care of ordinary cases of sickness and accident, and if he is competent to perform the operations himself it appears to the Department that he should be given an opportunity to do so. The first consideration, of course, is that the work should be done by a thoroughly competent man. The removal of tonsils from a large number of children is a fairly grave responsibility. You, as a resident of the district, may be expected to be familiar with the qualifications of Doctor MacInnis, and the Department will be pleased to receive your opinion on this matter and to keep it confidential. In any case the subject should be candidly discussed between you and the Doctor so that there may be no misunderstanding.

While the Department has an arrangement with the Victoria General Hospital to care for cases of sickness at the rate of \$3.00 per day, including the fees of the Doctor, it is quite possible that the hospital may not be willing to have a large number of tonsil cases admitted under this arrangement. If you decide to advise the Department to have the patients sent to Halifax, it would be best for you to make a visit to the hospital and see what arrangements can be made in case the hospital authorities

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decline to accept these pupils under the inclusive arrangement.

If you think Doctor MacInnis can fulfil the requirements you might ascertain from him what his total fee would be for carrying out the operations. The Department usually obtains a substantial reduction in the case of a large number of operations, and it is suggested that the fee of \$20.00 per pupil should include the fees of the Anaesthetist and of a surgical nurse who should be retained during the progress of the work. Not more than 8 cases should be done on any one day.

The Department also wishes to be assured that the removal of tonsils from so many pupils is strictly required for the improvement of the health of each child concerned, and in this connection would appreciate an additional examination by Doctor MacInnis and the Doctor whom he calls in to assist him.

With regard to the optical work, it would be appreciated if you would submit the name of the Oculist or Optician whom you wish to employ.

Dear Sir:

Beg to inform you that with the aid of Dr. Campbell, of the Dept. of Public Health, N.S. we were able to have Ada MacDonald and Lucy Brooks admitted to the N.S. Sanatorium, Kentville. These we considered the worst of the five T.B. cases. The rate for them will be the same as for the other Indian children who in the past have been patients there.

What I would like to know is whether I will look after these two girls, as far as clothing etc. is concerned or will I inform agent Chalmers of Bear River, and Agent Lawlor of Shubenacadie, and have them attend to them. There is the possibility that after a few months that their condition may warrant them coming back to the school.

Reverend Sir,

The Department has received your letter of July 3rd reporting the admission to sanatorium of Ada MacDonald and Lucy Brooks. It is very satisfactory that you have been able to find accommodation for these children, and it will not be necessary for you to take further trouble with them as they are no longer school pupils.

It may possibly be advisable to restate the Department's views in regard to these tuberculous children. It is the policy of the Department to keep your school tuberculosis free, and in pursuance of that policy the essential feature is to prevent the entrance to the school of tuberculous children, and to remove from the school as soon as possible any who are found to have developed the disease. The disposition of the sick children is not the first consideration. If no other means can be found to care for them, they must be sent back to their reserves even though this course seems hard on them. In such a case they are no worse off than if they had not come to the school.

The Department is assured that you understand this point of view which has a bearing on the other tuberculous children whose removal you have not yet reported.

It would be impossible for any doctor to say how many of the thirty-one tonsil cases on which I reported have impairment of health on account of their enlarged tonsils and adenoids, but we cannot say how soon they might develop some organic condition on account of bad tonsils.

The schedule of fees for tonsils is 20.00 and 5.00 for anaesthetic. If I try to have these cases done for \$15.00 + 5.00 for

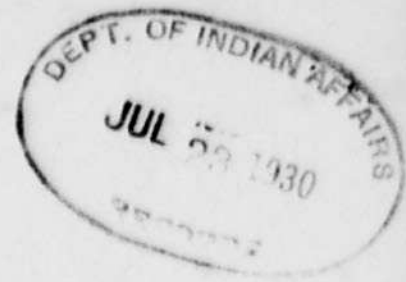
anaesthetic and I have to pay an assistant from the city and a nurse I have to do my work gratis and I don't think the Dept should ask me to do that.

Enclosed you will find Dr. MacInnis' opinion concerning the question of tonsils. It is evident that he is not to perform the operation, but only give the anaesthetic. I made inquiries at the V.G. Hospital, Halifax, but they cannot take any cases there till after the middle of September. It might be worth while to try the hospital at Truro, only twenty-two miles from here. They are not crowded there and the suggestion itself came from Dr. MacInnis.

Reverend Sir,

In reply to your letter of July 21st referring to the operations for removal of tonsils of pupils at your school, I have to advise you that the Department has decided to provide a sum of \$300.00 for the payment of the surgeon who will be called in to do the work. Doctor MacInnis may charge a fee of \$5.00 for each anaesthetic given, and in addition, the Department will pay for the services of a surgical nurse for a period not exceeding 6 days. It will be possible for you and Doctor MacInnis to co-operate in finding a surgeon at Halifax or Truro who can come to the school for this work. It is recommended that the pupils be divided into three groups of 10, and that the operations on each group be separated for a sufficient time to allow the preceeding group to recover beyond the point of danger, which will probably require about two days.

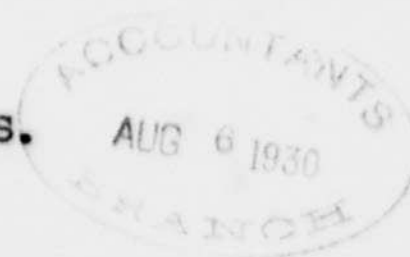
