

Dear Mr. Daunt:

I am enclosing herewith Requisition Forms in triplicate for extra seating. The need is all in our three lower rooms. Our new children seem to be getting more nearly the grade age in White schools, and consequently our Primary, Junior and Intermediate classes are more crowded.

In our Primary Room we have forty-six pupils with forty desks. Miss Enves has been getting along using small tables, but it is not very satisfactory. The large class is due to our keeping the Primary children in school all day. They are very much better there than running about, and they are not big enough to do any work. I am asking for five No.5 desks for this room. In our Junior Room we have thirty-five desks, but we have forty-one in the afternoon class, and here again the teacher is getting along with improvised seats. We really need at least four No.4 seats. We can improvise for a couple of pupils well enough, but to seat six in improvised fashion is out of the question. In our Intermediate Room we have forty-two in the afternoon class with thirty-six desks. Here again we can improvise for three without difficulty, but we need very badly three No.2 desks, for the Intermediate classroom.

I trust that the Department may be able to furnish these, as it will facilitate the work and discipline of the classrooms greatly.

Dear Sir:

I beg to transmit herewith a letter from Indian Agent Daunt, in which he recommends that the Department authorize an expenditure of \$980.84 on repairs and new equipment for Coqual-eetza Indian Residential School out of the appropriation of \$2000.00 provided by the Department for such purposes. A copy of the Rev. Principal's letter to Mr. Daunt is attached hereto in which the various items making up the sum of \$980.84 are listed.

Improved toilet and urinal arrangements are urgently needed at this school, and it is not understood why the Reverend Principal did not take action earlier in the year to seek authority for this expenditure and arrange to have the work carried out during the summer holidays, especially when he was aware that a sum of \$2000.00 had been set aside by the Department to cover cost of repairs and new equipment.

Authority has already been received for the purchase of a new gang plow, which it is the intention of Principal Scott to purchase at an early date.

A set of disc harrows is necessary and should form part of the farm equipment.

The application is recommended for favorable consideration, and if funds are not available to take care of all the work, it is respectfully suggested that the items should be considered in the following order of importance:-

- (a) Urinals and toilet equipment, including toilet valves - \$683.34
- (b) Repairs to eaves troughing and drain pipes, school and barn - 12.00

Dear Mr Daunt:

I believe there is an amount of \$ 982.67 which remains unexpended of the \$2000.00 allowed for new equipment and repairs for the year 1937-8 which is now drawing to a close. As there does not seem to be any need for waiting further for what might be termed emergency items, I wish to submit the following list of really important items which I trust the Department will give its sympathetic consideration.

1. Disc Harrows: ----- \$ 89.00

The Department was good enough to authorize the purchase of a Gang Flow, and for the same reason I am asking for a set of Disc Harrows, namely, we have none of our own. For years we have borrowed and have had to await the time when neighbors could lend us theirs. As the years have passed this has been more and more difficult until now it has become exceedingly uncomfortable, and it results in loss to the Farm through delays. I have taken this item up with the Massey Harris Company through their local agent, Ironsides Ltd, of Chilliwack, and they can put in a set of \$2 -suitable for a three horse team, and supply carrier for the tongue for the same at the above price. I trust that the Department will grant us this; it is fundamentally necessary for the Farm work and for the training of our Farm boys as well.

2. Urinals and Toilet Equipment: ----- \$ 683.34

Not long ago, I believe Inspector Barry sent in a report criticizing very severely, our toilets and Lavatory conditions generally. I wrote to the Department through you on that matter. At the same time, it is very urgent that we get the items listed at the foot of this paragraph. I may say that I have had Dr McQuarrie and Dr Henderson, our Local Medical Health Officer look over these premises and equipment and they both declare that it is "impossible" for us to keep these Toilets free from odor owing to the fact the the urine has penetrated the floor materials at the front of the toilets. Overseers on both sides do their best, and while I do not for a moment admit the situation to be just as Inspector Barry has apparently presented it, still it is imperative that something be done to lessen the danger to floors, with consequent odors, and perhaps menace to health. Certainly it is prejudicial to comfort or satisfaction to any of us.

I took this matter up with the Department some two years ago, and submitted prices etc, but nothing has been done. I feel that if now, after receiving reports as noted above, if nothing is done, the responsibility for conditions will have to rest with the Department. I shall still do my best in any case.

We have done away with the bed room pails in the dormitories, and have put in partitions in the corridors so that the toilets are available to the boys during the night. At present they have to use the Toilet bowls and it is in this way the floors become saturated with the dropping of urine, a certain amount of which is bound to find its way to the floors. The use of a urinal - a 1- Stall in each of the upper Lavatories would lessen this difficulty at least fifty per cent, if not to completely eliminate it.

The 2- Stall Urinals are for the Basement Lavatories where the boys wash and use toilet facilities at least three times a day.

I may say that we are very much pleased with the way the boys are responding to the endeavor we are making to give them better toilet facilities, such as toilet paper, deodorizers etc, and I feel sure that if we had these urinals, they would give hearty support to our efforts to improve conditions. I would urge this item upon the Department for most favorable consideration.

The matter of the new valves for both Boys' and Girls' sides, and for one Staff Lavatory, is almost an emergency one. In fact it is all that. The old valves have been in use since the original installation. I have renewed diaphragms, gaskets and other parts, but it is quite impossible to make these old ones function. In some cases they have had to be turned off, and are standing useless - one of the facts which Inspector Barry noted - and they simply cannot be made to work further. All rough labor, apart from the Overseeing Cement worker to be done by the boys of the Manual Training Department of the School. The difference in cost of fittings on above Urinals is due to the different outlets which must be found for the same. All materials to be submitted with itemized cost, and labor costs to be set down at hourly rates, with the time taken etc.

3. Re-shingling of two outbuildings: ----- \$ 54.00

One of these buildings is our Boat Shop, and the other is a building we are using for a Grainary. Both are in great need of re-roofing. This work, apart from the 18,000 shingles needed, to be done by the boys of the Manual Training Department of the School. This item was authorized some time ago, but we have not been able to get the work done. This was largely due to the Measles Epidemic of Last Fall, which made it impossible to carry out plans. The work will be done as soon as the weather permits.

4. Gang Plow:----- \$ 142.50

This item also was authorized previously. The Plow is now in Chilliwack ready for delivery as soon as we need it for the Spring work.

There may be some saving on these figures, but they are very close. 



In case of fire in the daytime or early morning or after supper in the early evening, our present alarm would not be heard in the Kitchen, Laundry, Dining Room, nor at the Barns or Manual Training Building. It is planned to put one of these alarms in the corridor leading to Staff and Student Dining Rooms, Staff and Student Kitchens, Laundry, Bakeshop and Shoe Repair Shop. Then the second gong would be put on the end of the Boiler Room outside, which would throw the sound to the barns and Manual Training Building quite easily. As there are at least a dozen boys and the Farm Instructor busy milking both morning and evening, it is quite important that they should hear the alarm in case of fire.

I would also like to have three small Fire Extinguishers added to our equipment, one to be placed in the Sewing Room, and one in the Mending Room, and one in a dormitory above the Manual Training Building, which we some times use.



General:

The Contractor tendering on this work shall examine the premises and determine for themselves the amount and nature of the various works required, as it is the intention that everything necessary for a complete and perfect job shall be included and no excuse shall be taken for any oversight.

The Contractor shall supply all scaffolding, tools, materials and labour required to properly carry on the work to completion as speedily as possible. The materials used to be the best of the several kinds.

The whole of the works are to be carried out to the entire satisfaction of the Government Official acting under the instructions of the Department. Colours, etc., will also be selected by him.

The Contractor shall, on completion, leave the premises neat and clean, removing all rubbish and dirt whatsoever, and also repairing any damage to walls, glass and such like that may have arisen prior to the works being handed over.

Labour:

In the execution of the work as far as practicable and consistent with reasonable efficiency and economy, first consideration shall be given to the employment of those who if available and competent are most in need in the locality in which the works are to be performed, without any discrimination whatsoever; preference being shown to unemployed ex-service men and unemployed married and single men with dependents.

First Class Job:

Any work or material obviously necessary for the proper completion of the work, although not specified herein, is to be done or supplied by the Contractor without additional charge, it being understood that the amount of the tender covers everything necessary for a complete and first class job.

Character of Works, etc.

All the work is to be executed in a substantial and workmanlike manner and of the best materials and workmanship of their several kinds, in accordance with the specification and instructions given from time to time and all of the said work is to be carried out and completed under the inspection of the Officer in charge or his representative to the full and entire satisfaction of the

INSTALLATIONS:

Boiler to be constructed of steel. The shell plates to have a tensile strength of 65,000 lbs. The Longitudinal seam to be D.R.B.S. The furnace plates to have a tensile strength of 55,000 lbs., and the Longitudinal Seam to be S.R. lap.

Tubes to be of the best standard quality, and to be 2" outside diameter and rolled and beaded at each end.

Boiler Mountings.

- A Water Gauge Glass, & Guard & Hooks.

- A 1" Everlasting Type Blow Down Cock. The Nipple between blow-down cock and boiler to be extra heavy black pipe.
- 1 3/4" Injector including all necessary valves and checks.
- A 6" Dial pressure Gauge graduated to 250 lbs. with syphon and cock.

Smoke Pipe and Hood:

Supply and install a new smoke pipe and hood made out of heavy black iron, Hood to be flat top and to have a removable cover so arranged that free access to the tubes and tube sheet can be obtained.
