

MEMORANDUM:

The Honourable the Superintendent General,-

Funds have been provided, in the Appropriation for Indian Education for the current fiscal year, to supply laundry equipment and to paint the barn, at the St. Mary's Mission Indian Residential School, Mission City, B. C. (Electoral District of Fraser Valley), as follows:

Laundry equipment	-	\$850.00 ✓
Painting barn	-	850.00

The local Indian Agent, after taking up the matter with the Principal, states the latter requested that the following laundry equipment be supplied:-

12 h. p. Vertical Boiler	-	\$490.00
Simplex Ironer	-	285.00
Beatty Ironer	-	116.00
Laundry Washer	-	193.00

This is \$234.00 in excess of the amount provided for these items, but the school authorities are prepared to absorb this amount in respect to the laundry equipment. Dear Sir:

With reference to your letter dated August 22nd, last, relative to the supplying of laundry equipment and the painting of the barn, etc., at the St. Mary's Mission Indian Residential School, I now have to inform you that approval has been granted to incur the expenditure required for the above purposes, to the amount of \$850 for laundry equipment and \$850 for painting barn.

You may place an order with the Vancouver Iron Works, Limited, to supply the 12 h. p. vertical boiler, as per their quotation of August 18th, last, to Rev. Father Gillen, viz.: \$590, less \$100 for the present old boiler, the old boiler to be taken at the time the new one arrives.



It is understood that the Department will only be responsible for the sum of \$850 towards the cost of the laundry equipment and the sum of \$850 towards the cost of painting and repairs to the barn - the amount in excess to be absorbed by the school authorities.

When the laundry equipment has been purchased, you should obtain an itemized account, in triplicate, covering the cost. This, you should attach to proper voucher forms, certify in the usual manner and forward for payment.

With reference to the work in painting the barn, the account should show in detail the work carried out, the materials supplied, the days or hours employed and the rate paid to the men engaged on the work.



E X T R A C T from Report of Mr. G. H. Barry, District Inspector of Indian Schools, Victoria, B. C., regarding his inspection of the ST. MARY'S MISSION INDIAN RESIDENTIAL SCHOOL on the 25th and 26th January, 1937.

Fire Protection:- In my last report I stated that four new Fire Escapes had been erected. For some reason the iron ladders at the bottom of these escapes stop short about eight feet from the ground. Wooden ladders, kept in a shed somewhere, are supposed to be placed at the bottom of escapes by the first pupil down. This is a very bad plan indeed and would of course hold up the escape of the pupils during an actual fire.

Owing to the terrible weather conditions I could not possibly hold a Fire Drill myself, and I would hesitate to hold a drill down the present iron fire escapes, particularly in very cold weather. In my opinion about seven feet of iron ladder should be at once added to each of the four fire escapes to take them to the ground or within a foot of it. This would make the holding of Fire Drills possible except in the worst weather and the children would have reasonable protection in case of fire. Should it be argued that boys would climb the escapes if such iron extensions be added, I may say that with wooden ladders available they can do this now.

In my last report, I mentioned that eight new Fire Extinguishers had been asked for, and though I looked for these, I was not able to trace them. Some of the present old extinguishers might be used in such places as the Manual Training Shop, but I feel certain that more extinguishers are needed here at Mission.

While there is good pressure in the pipes should it be necessary to fight a small fire, the Fire Hose is not sufficient. The Reverend Principal is measuring the extra quantity of hose necessary to give protection and will communicate with the Department through the Indian Agent. I understand that the school authorities are prepared to build small hose sheds near the outside Fire Hydrants or Stand Pipes. I am informed that though dug out twice a year these outside Fire Hydrants become rusted below ground level and could not possibly be turned on in case of fire at times other than immediately after attention has been given to them as mentioned.

The Fire Alarm system is not a general one. The buildings are scattered. I do think that several new alarm bells are required which should include at least two large gongs on the Boys' and Girls' sides respectively. With such gongs in operation general Fire Drills could be practised.

In general I may say that while the construction of the new buildings and repairs to the old have greatly reduced the fire risk at this school, I AM NOT SATISFIED WITH PRESENT CONDITIONS. I would therefore ask that the Department would have a general survey of this school made with regard to Fire Control with a view to the further reduction of risk to the children and staff, and that they ask for the views of the Indian Agent in this matter. I know that the present Principal is not satisfied and understand that he is writing to the Department at about the same time as this report goes forward to Ottawa.

Dear Sir,-

The Department is in receipt of your No. 1-8-A of the 26th ultimo, with reference to the request of the Principal of the St. Mary's Mission Indian Residential School for certain fire appliances.

It is not considered necessary to secure the services of the District Resident Architect, Department of Public Works, Victoria, B. C. It is felt that, if you visit the school at an early date, you can go over the building carefully with the Principal and decide what additional fire appliances are absolutely necessary. You should then report to the Department, giving your recommendations and, also, an estimate of the cost involved.

For your information, I enclose an extract from the report of Inspector Barry regarding his inspection of the St. Mary's Mission School on the 25th and 26th ultimo. When visiting this school, you should also inspect the fire escapes and report the approximate cost of lengthening the fire escapes in order that they will reach practically to the ground.

I return the list of appliances requested by Father O'Grady, in order that you may have full information when you visit the school.



The Department is in receipt of your No. 1-8-A of the 4th instant, with reference to painting the barn at the St. Mary's Mission Indian Residential School.




