

of the Principal I did instruct this girl to be discharged at once, contending that if the father was able to provide at home this was satisfactory and that the vacancy created would allow for another pupil to be placed in the school, as there are many applicants.

There has been a large number of truants from this school of late and in procuring the return of these pupils to the school and on enquiring as to why they ran away, Constable Bella of the R.C.M.P. has stated to me that some of these truants on being apprehended complain to him that they are not receiving enough to eat and being made to eat foods that they were not accustomed to and did not like and could not eat.

This complaint of the children can be understood to some extent, as no doubt the foods they receive at Mount Elgin are not of the same nature they had received at their homes, where they go in for a considerable amount of salt pork, and other heavy foods, which they, under the present system at Mount Elgin, do not receive.

Dr. McLeod is making a survey of the school as to the health conditions in general at the school and pending his report to you, I will speak to the Principal of the school to give attention to the feeding of his pupils, as I am informed that the children working in the kitchen are always well fed and it may be possible that these children take foods that should be given to the smaller pupils in the dining room and that these small pupils go short and this would be the result of bad supervision by the officer of the school in charge and should be stopped by her. It is possible these children in the kitchen are playing favourite to their friends in the dining-room of other non-friends.

With reference to the report requested on health conditions at this school, I would advise that Dr. McLeod, Med. Supt. of this Agency, did submit a full report to the Deputy Superintendent General on the 17th instant and no doubt this report gave full details as to conditions at Mount Elgin with regards health and food and as I have been informed of this report of the Med. Supt. I would concur with this report and would recommend that additional meat and butter be given the pupils at this school, who in my mind should at least receive the same allowances of meat that is given in the relief rations, namely 8 pounds of meat per month to all children over 10 years of age and half that amount for children under 10 years, which according to the principal's own statement to the Doctor and myself, they only receive 500 pounds a month for 150 pupils, which is supplemented by the pupils receiving an egg on odd occasions.

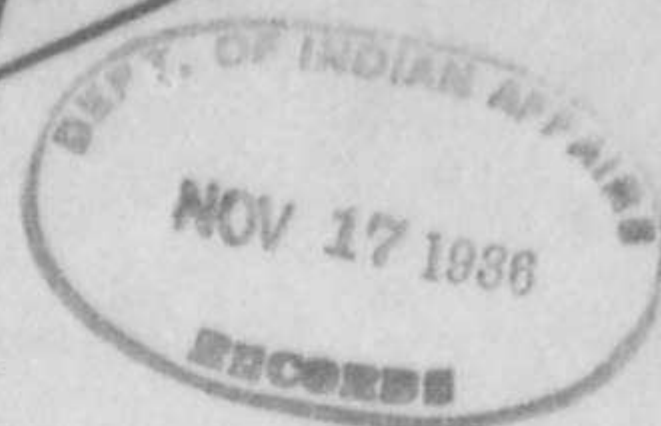

Sir;

With further reference to the pupils of Mount Elgin Residential School, and their health, Miss McCaig and I have prepared a suitable diet for children who are underweight. A copy of this diet is enclosed. We have endeavoured to get away from elaborate food preparations, and at the same time to provide a range of choice for each meal, at a minimum of inconvenience.

A copy of this diet was provided Mr. Strapp, Principal of the school some time ago, and he expressed a willingness to cooperate in administering same. He reiterated the fact that absence of refrigeration facilities would curtail the daily serving of fresh meat, but this will be overcome with the onset of cooler weather.

As instructed in your letter of October 22nd I will repeat my recommendations regarding the services of a dentist, and tonsillectomy for some of these children, after the New Year, when financial arrangements may be better facilitated. An estimate of the cost involved will be given at that time. I am Sir,

Sir;

With further reference to pupils of Mount Elgin Residential School who have been underweight, I am enclosing a report on the weights of these children taken on the 23rd instant.

In a letter to me of October 22nd last, in which you requested a special diet list it was intimated that the school authorities were willing to provide a separate dining room for these children. I have to report that Miss McCaig and I spent considerable time preparing a suitable diet list, a copy of which was sent to Ottawa, and similar copy given to the Principal of the School but that this diet has not been followed nor has the separate dining room been instituted. This information comes from the lady superintendent, and the staff nurse.

However, mid morning, and mid afternoon nourishment, including milk, has been given to the underweight children. The results have been very gratifying in that practically normal weight has been reached by all of these pupils. On further discontinuance of extra food several of them lost weight, requiring resumption of feeding between meals.

Failure to provide a separate dining room, and to follow the special diet list of October last was not on my instruction, but was initiated solely by the school staff. Rev. O.B.Strapp has been ill, and in hospital, and this may account for the change of plans. He has since returned to duty.

I have not discussed the omission of this diet list with him on the assumption that I should first report the circumstances to your office where the initial instruction on same originated. This passive resistance is typical of the school in relation to this office.

My relations with the staff have been in harmony, with the exception that those in authority manifest a determination to have their own way in rulings of the Department. The dietician on duty did not appreciate preparation of the special diet list when it was discussed with her.

While no controversy on this subject is desired, I feel that it is my duty to report what has not been done in regard to your wishes. Mr. A.D.Moore, Indian Agent, concurs in this view. I am, Sir,

Dear Sir:

In your letter of December 29th you state that though the undernourished children at the Mount Elgin Institute were not provided with a separate dining room they did receive for a time extra food and that on this additional diet their weight came up to practically normal. I presume that you are not concerned how the good result is arrived at if it is accomplished and that your only reason for complaint is that the extra diets were not continued, in some cases at least.

The proposal to set up a separate dining room was made by the Principal of the school on a visit to the Department, and the Department's recommendation was based on his proposal. The method by which the children's weight is maintained is perhaps not important but it is important that it should be maintained, and you are entitled to make adequate representations to the Principal to this effect. It is a duty I would say. The terms of your letter rather suggest that you would prefer to deal with the matter yourself for the moment but the Department is prepared to write to the Principal if you think it advisable. It does not wish to involve you in any possible difficulty and would be pleased to receive any suggestions you might have for a letter to the Principal of the school if you think one is in order.

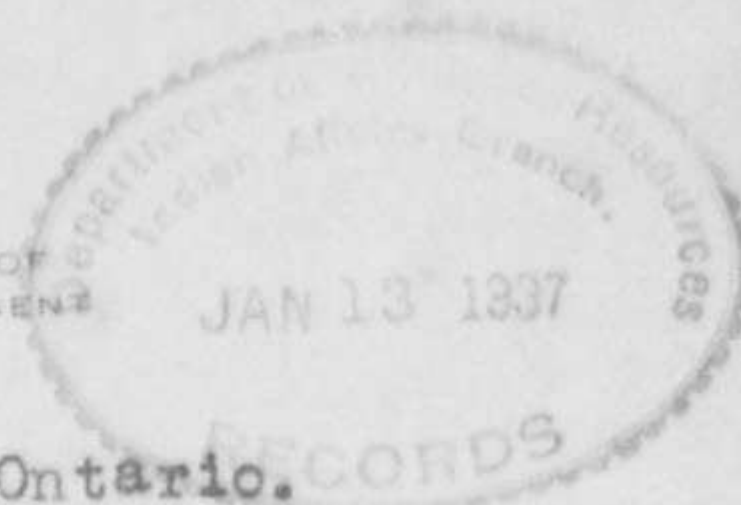

Sir; Your file 7-0-13- Mount Elgin Residential School.

With further reference to pupils of the above school who were underweight, and your letter of the 5th instant, I have to report that I am quite pleased with the results obtained. My motive in writing December 29th, was not of complaint, but more to acquaint Dr. McGill with the fact that proposals made by the Principal to the Department, and passed along to me by Dr. McGill were not being carried out. I felt that the Department reasonably expected a separate dining room for underweight pupils had been inaugurated as promised, and should be made aware through me that nothing along this line had been done.

I do not believe that it would be advisable to write the Principal in view of the improvement made by these children. If under the present system normal weight is not maintained, to be revealed by periodic check-up on my part, a letter could be drafted at a later date.

There have been no major difficulties experienced with the Principal and staff of Mount Elgin Residential School by me. Minor ones include the determination manifested of attempts to safeguard the pupils' health in methods other than those of your Medical Superintendent, the usual objection to the latter and those laid down by the Department being that they prove to be too great an inconvenience. This difficulty mainly involves the treatment of Trachoma, and the opportunity presented by the separate dining room proposal enabled me to bring the situation to the attention of Ottawa.

With the gratifying results obtained with weight production, I would prefer to let the case rest for the present. This in view of the fact that the Principal has been ill, and in hospital, although now completely recovered.

If the occasion should warrant same due to weight loss, proper representation can be made to him both from the Department and myself at the time. Careful observation of the weight of pupils will be made, and it is my opinion that there will not be any great difficulty encountered in view of the excellent recovery of the children involved.

Sir;

In a letter dated October 22nd, 1936, from Dr. H. McGill, Director, I was informed that owing to lack of funds, recommendations made by me regarding the pupils of Mount Elgin Residential School could not be authorized at that time. I was directed to again submit these recommendations after the New Year in the hope that the financial situation would have improved.

I have visited the school and accordingly make the following recommendations;

1. That authority be granted for refraction of fourteen pupils, and glasses for eyes supplied if necessary at an estimated cost of \$140.

2. That the services of a dentist be engaged for four days at an estimated cost of \$120.

3. That provision be made for removal of tonsils of eleven pupils, when written consent from parents is obtained by the Principal at an estimated cost of \$65.

I am mindful of the fact that the financial situation of Medical Department has not improved, but am repeating the recommendations as directed. In the absence of authority for this work I would request permission to proceed with tonsillectomy in about four cases which show marked hypertrophy and disease. This work could be carried out when and as hospital facilities are available. I am, Sir,

Dear Doctor Stone;

I have to report one case of Scarlet Fever, and eighteen cases of Influenza among the pupils at Mount Elgin Residential School. The former case was of such a mild nature that I called in Dr. Pardy, Medical Officer of Health for Caradoc Township to share the responsibility of the diagnosis, owing to the long quarantine involved. The rash was typical, but the only sign of illness was a temperature of 99 degrees manifested by the patient. To be on the safe side we have diagnosed Scarlet Fever, with the usual regulation precautions, and any further cases will be reported to you. There was no history of exposure, although there have been one case in Caradoc Township, and one in adjoining Ekfrid Township.

The Influenza at the school is quite mild with no complications to date. Mr. Strapp, Principal, set aside an upper dormitory in which the Scarlet Fever case is isolated at one end with screen, and the Influenza at the opposite extremity. He was quite willing to help in the situation but emphatically reiterated that he was taking no responsibility for results owing to the lack of hospital facilities at the school. Since he will not be expected to assume any great burden of responsibility his remarks were passed without comment.

This brings my total of Influenza cases to 90, with some Pneumonias particularly in aged and the children. Deaths have totalled two as previously reported. I may say that prior to calling Dr. Pardy the proposal was discussed with Mr. Moore yesterday, and he approved.

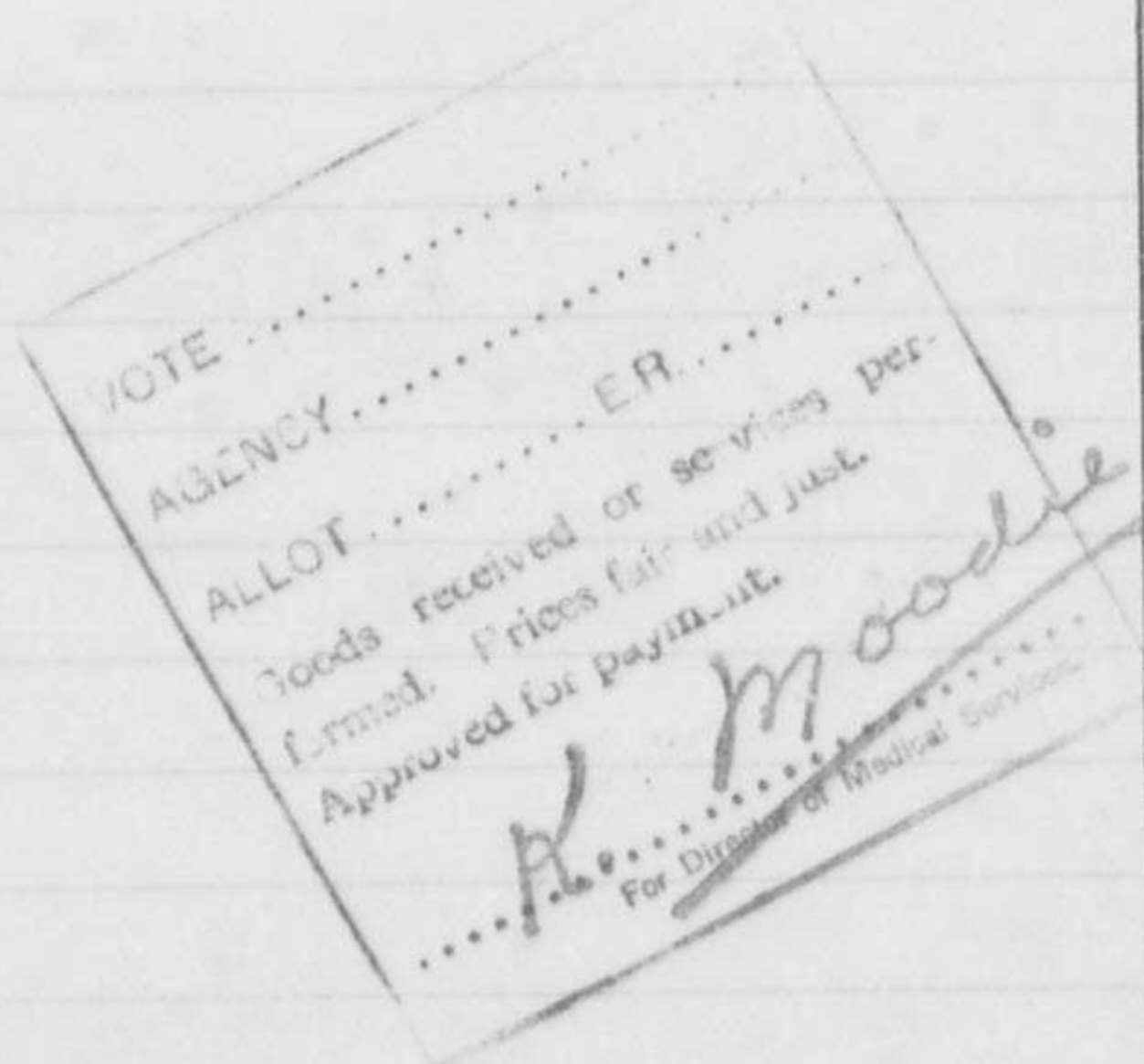

At the request of the Principal of Mount Elgin Residential School, I have examined Truman Antone, aged 16, and Kathleen Simon, aged 18, pupils who will be writing the entrance examinations for high school on June 25th. Both pupils suffer from defective vision which may handicap them in their tests.

It is the intention of the Principal that both these pupils be discharged from the school this year, and it is recommended that authority be granted for refraction and eye glasses at a cost not exceeding ten dollars per pupil.

If these pupils leave the school without glasses it is unlikely that they will obtain sufficient funds to purchase them for some time, and their tests show that the glasses will be of great advantage to them in concluding their school work.

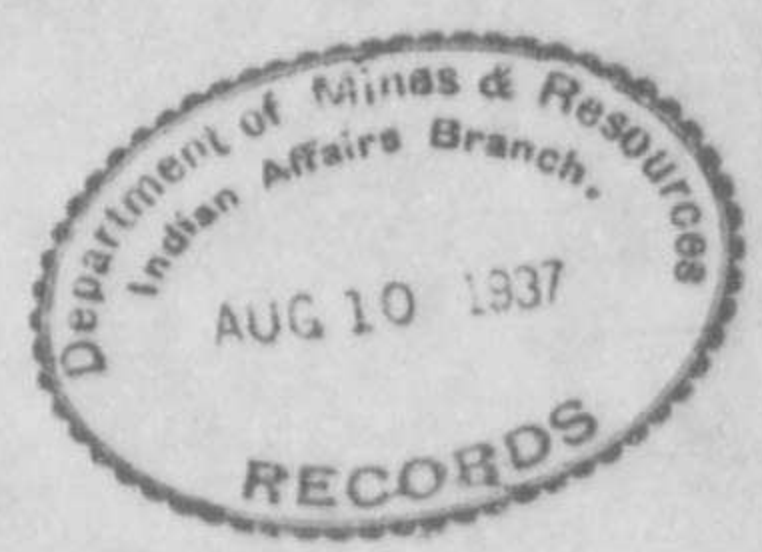

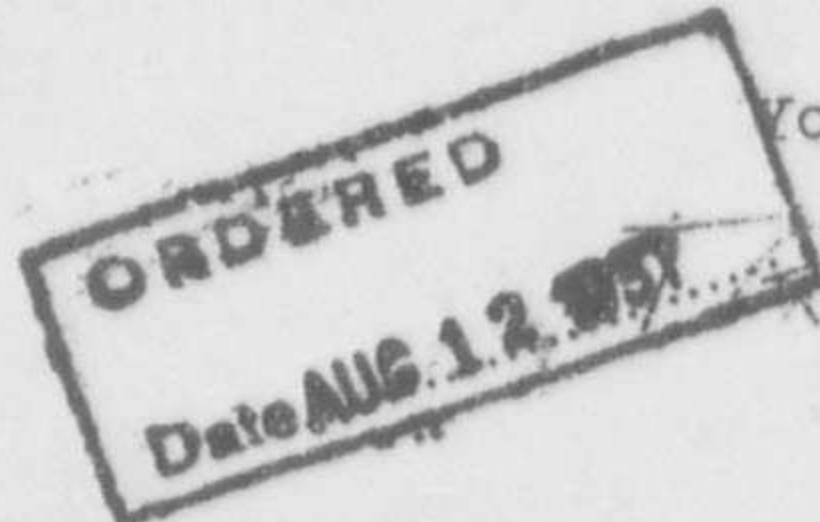

Dear Doctor Stone;

I have to report the presence of Chicken-Pox at Mount Elgin Residential School. There are two cases, brothers, new pupils, and one suspect.

Source of the disease is unknown, and there are no cases on the local reserves. The usual precautions for isolation have been taken.

To date we have escaped infantile paralysis, which seems to be on the wane among the district white population.

Dr. Wall has concluded his survey and was pleased with the improvement noted in Trachoma at this Agency. I took him to Walpole Island this week, where we met Dr. Rowland, and visited the schools.

I have a letter from Dr. Brink stating that all his staff and himself have been assigned to the poliomyelitis outbreak, and that he would be unable to confer with me until this situation is in hand.
