Memorandum.

Mr. Moffat:-

The Dunbow (St. Joseph's) Indian Industrial School, south of Calgary, Alta., is being closed. The buildings are long past their usefulness and the work has been steadily decreasing in importance. Would you please prepare a memorandum to Council, requesting a transfer of the property to the Department of the Interior. The following is the description:-

To transfer to the Department of the Interior as Crown lands the 1,826 acres connected with the St. Joseph's Indian Industrial school, at Dunbow, Alta.,

The approximate 400 acres contained in the first four lines of the description in the Report herewith, and the 73 and 320 acres respectively in the fifth and sixth lines, were obtained direct from the Department of the Interior for the purposes of the school. The 320 acres mentioned in the seventh line were purchased from the H.B. Co., for \$1,600; the 160 acres mentioned in the eighth line were purchased from E.A. Wyndham for \$200; and the 553 acres mentioned in the concluding portion of the description were purchased from the C.P.R. for \$2,448.50.

Owing to the closing of the school, these lands are of no further use to this Department, and it is proposed to hand them over to the Interior Department as Crown lands for the purposes of that Department.

Dear Sirs:

We have been requested by our clients, Mr. Edwin Cole, Farmer of De Winton, whom we have known for some considerable time to be a reasonable and reliable farmer, to approach you with a view to his leasing from your Department some 1170 acres of land in Township 28, Range 21, West of the 4th Meridian, being approximately 80 acres on the S. E. 34, 630 acres of Section 27 and 160 acres of the N. E. 26 and 300 acres of the E. 1/2 of 22. Mr. Cole informs us that he understands this comprises school lands but that the Indian School, St. Joseph's Industrial School, has been closed. ?

No doubt in these circumstances the lands will be available for leasing for farm purposes, and Mr. Cole wishes to know whether you will entertain an application for a lease from him and the terms and conditions on which your Department would be prepared to lease, either cash rent or crop shares. The Committee of the Privy Council have had before them a report, dated 18th November, 1922, from the Superintendent General of Indian Affairs, submitting that, owing to the closing down of the St. Joseph's (High River) Indian Industrial School at Dunbow, in the province of Alberta, the lands connected therewith, comprising 1,825 acres, more or less, are of no further use to the Department of Indian Affairs and should now be placed at the disposal of the Department of the Interior as Crown lands for the purposes of that Department.

The Minister accordingly recommends that the above mentioned 1,826 acres of land, described as follows, be herewith transferred to the Department of the Interior of Canada:

Dear Mr. Graham : -

I have the honour to submit the following report in connection with the closing of the St. Joseph's Industrial School at De Winton, Alberta.

I left Regina by Canadian Pacific Railway at 4 o'clock a.m. on the 29th of October and arrived at the school, which is ten miles from the Railway Station, at noon of the 30th. I spent the afternoon going through the buildings, locating the equipment and sizing up the situation generally. I found that apart from the original furnishings supplied to the school in 1884, and some desks supplied four or five years ago, that practically all the tables, benches, clothes closets and other furniture had been made at the school, and while they were well made and very useful they were not a good selling proposition except to provide for the requirements of a similar Institution. Very little of the furniture would have been worth paying freight on to Regina, I therefore, in accordance with your instructions, apportioned it amongst the Roman Catholic Schools in the Province of Alberta. You will find detailed lists of the material shipped to each school attached to this report.

The Principals of the Roman Catholic Schools at the Blackfoot, Blood and Peigan Reserves, as well as the Sisters of the Assumption from Hobbema, arrived at the school on the morning of the 31st and made their selection of equipment, implements and stock. I then immediately started the staff and pupils at clearing the furniture and equipment out of the rooms, and packing and crating same for shipment. I also had the stock rounded up and carefully classified them. The four school teams were kept busily engaged hauling out the grain and other equipment to the Railway. I also received assistance from Father Ruaux of the Blood School and Father Laverne of the Peigan School. The former supplied two teams and men, and the latter one team and a man. Father Riou of the Blackfoot school hauled his stuff over land. After the requirements of the schools had been supplied there remained very little equipment and implements to dispose of. I sold the live-stock, grain and feed to the very best advantage after making every effort to get the best possible prices.

The following is a detailed statement of the receipts and expenditures for the month of November during the time I was in charge:

A detailed copy of the cash book entries of receipts and disbursements for the month of November is attached to this report. I am also submitting financial statements for the past two years. I may inform you that I paid all out standing accounts incurred this year, as well as the current year's salaries due to all employees with the exception of the Principal and the Grey Nuns. The arrears of salary due to the Principal and the Sisters are the only liabilities that are left unpaid. I have checked their accounts through carefully from March 31, 1914, and am in a position to certify that the balance shown as in arrears is correct. I would point out, however, that up to April 1917 each employee had a separate ledger account. In April 1917 the arrears of salary due to Brother Thomas Merkin, the Farming Instructor, and Brother John Merkin, the Engineer and Carpenter, were taken over by the Principal, Father Noraman and until April 1920, the three combined salaries were charged up in the one account. In April 1920, after Father Demers took charge, these accounts were again separated and the Farming Instructor's and Engineer's accounts have been kept paid up in full, the Principal still assuming the total deficit which at October 31, 1922 amounted to \$4324.19. I was approached by both the Bursar of the Order of Oblate Fathers, and the Superior of the Grey Nuns who asked me to pay these arrears, however, as I had no instructions to pay anything but the current year's expenditures I refused to do this. I may say however, that in view of the fact that the salaries of both the Principal and the Grey Nuns have not been increased since the school was established in 1884, that their claim for the payment

of arrears appears to me to be a legitimate one. The arrears of salary due the Grey Nuns at October 31, 1922 amounted to \$1225.18. The Sisters remained at the school until November 23, and gave me great assistance in the work of closing the Institution. They left the school in a clean and tidy condition throughout.

CATTLE.

The cattle on hand were as follows :

- 2- Bulls.
- 8- Dry Cows.
- 48- Wet Cows.
- 52- Calves. (4 late calves, no value)
- 15- Two-year-old Steers (1 no value, sick)
- 15- One-year-old steers.
- 11- Two-year-old Heifers (2 no value, sick)
- 10- One-year-old Heifers.

The following cattle were supplied to the Roman Catholic Schools free of charge:

- 2- Bulls to Duck Lake School.
- 6- Cows to Blackfoot School.
- 10- Cows to Blood School.
- 5- Cows to Peigan School.

The balance of the cattle were sold through Agent Faunt at the Blood Reserve for a lump sum of \$2500.00. This was a very fair price considering the market conditions, and was more than the herd would have realized if they had been sold over the scales in the Calgary Stock Yards. I may say that I went to Calgary and visited the Stock Yards and noted the prices the cattle were bringing when sold by weight. I also had representatives from three commission firms, namely Pat Burns & Company, Mayland & Company and D. McIntosh & Company, come to the school. I could not get a definite offer for the wet cows as they were not in demand and were only bringing from one and a quarter to one and three quarter cents per pound on the market, which would mean that a cow weighing 1200 pounds would only realize from \$15.00 to \$21.00, according to quality, and as the cows were a very good type of Shorthorn

breeding stock, it would have been a pity to have sold them at a sacrifice for beef. Hearing that Agent Faunt had funds available for the purchase of cattle, I got into communication with him and we agreed upon a price which is a bargain for the Indians, and at the same time the Department have received full market value of the cattle.

HORSES:

The horses consisted of one nine-year-old Clyde Stallion, six work teams, and twenty one head of young animals, including three foals. Six of the best work horses were given to the Blood Roman Catholic Boarding School, and the balance were sold for \$1000.00 to Agent Faunt. The Stallion, although a good type of Clyde, had his hocks accidentally damaged, which rendered him worthless for sale purposes, and I sent him to the Blood Reserve where he will probably give them good service for a few years. There was no demand for horses in the Calgary district, and after making full enquiry and acquainting myself with values, I am satisfied that the horses were well sold. The only other offer I received was \$1000.00 for the whole lot, including the six horses which were handed over to the School.

PIGS:

One brood sow was given to the Blackfoot School, and two to the school on the Blood Reserve. There were twenty-four late young pigs which I sold at the best offer I received, \$4.50 each.

GRAIN:

The wheat was sold previous to my arrival at the school. 1076½ bushels of oats and 912 bushels of barley were hauled out to De Winton by the school teams. The balance

of the oats, 2300 bushels were sold in the bin by measurement, at .37¢ per bushel, less .05¢ allowance for hauling. I considered it advisable to do this as there would have been considerable delay before we could have hauled them out with our own teams. I sold 85 loads of wheat and oat straw at \$1.00 per load; the green feed on hand, at \$8.00 per ton. There was no hay on hand at the school. I made every effort to get the best prices possible for the stock, grain, etc., and only sold after receiving several offers.

The implements, furniture and equipment, were, as I have stated before, practically all distributed amongst the Roman Catholic Schools in the Province. A number of articles of furniture, dishes etc., not selected by the schools were given to Mr. Faunt for the purpose of equipping the Hospital at the Blood Reserve. There were a few clothes closets which had been built in the rooms and were too cumbersome to move, left behind. There were also thirty iron beds without springs, and sixteen large benches, left. These articles were placed in a room in the building and the door locked. Before leaving I had the water tanks, and all pipes in connection with the water and heating systems thoroughly drained. The acetylene gas generator was also thoroughly cleaned out and the buildings swept out from top to bottom, and all rubbish burned. The fixtures, such as bath tubs, basins, and pumping equipment, as well as the fire hose, were left in place, and the buildings are ready for occupation should they be required, at any time. I locked the doors and left the keys with Mr. Fred Davis, the closest neighboring farmer, who promised to keep the buildings under observation without remuneration, until further advised. He was given instructions not to permit anything to be removed from the premises unless with authority from the Department.

FARM:

I drove over the land which was set aside and purchased for the use of this school, and may inform you that there are approximately 500 acres under cultivation. Of this land, 175 acres were summer fallowed this Season, and the land is well harrowed and in good shape for cropping. I had several enquiries from farmers in the neighborhood who want to rent this land, and I have no doubt but that it could be rented to good advantage. It would be a pity to see this land go back to weeds. I may say that no record of the farming operations appears to have been kept at the school, and I am therefore, not in a position to give you details of their farming activities during the past few years.
