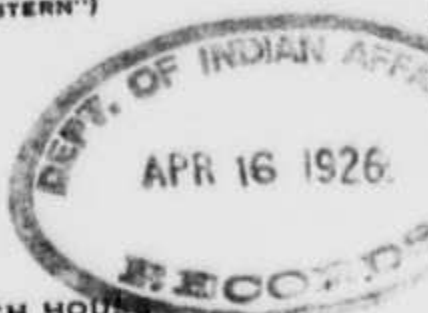

M.S.C.C. Herd Passes Test

It is very interesting to notice the progress which is being made at the Old Sun Indian Mission of the Missionary Society of the Church of Canada in the way of improving the originally mixed grade herd. Last week the second 60-day retest in the way of accreditation has been successfully passed by the government veterinarian. Another clean test in the next 60 days means that the herd will be fully accredited according to the rules and specifications of the department of agriculture at Ottawa. Not only will the school then have an accredited herd, but also the beginning of a fully purebred herd, as the grade cattle are being gradually fattened and butchered off and are being replaced with the dual purpose short-horn.

On January 24, 1926, the first test for T.B. was taken on the herd which proved to contain one reactor which was slaughtered immediately. It was very gratifying to receive the report from the government veterinarian that last week that not a single reactor was found.

Re- Seed Drill for Old Sun School.

The Principal of the Old Sun School has directed my attention to the urgent need of a new Seed Drill if the farming activities at this institution are to be properly carried on and developed. He states that the old drill, a LaCrosse, is now so obsolete that it is difficult almost to impossibility to get new parts or repairs. Moreover, he states that it does not seed evenly, and even misses rows from time to time. The cost of a new single disc, 20 run drill, of the latest all metal type, he estimates at approximately \$225.00 f.o.b. Gleichen, and I am writing at the urgent request of our Commission to ascertain if your Department can provide this very necessary item of equipment in time for the seeding operations this Spring.

I may mention for your information that in the same letter in which the Principal asked for the seed drill, he also requested an extra team of horses, and our Commission have agreed to purchase this team at a cost of approximately \$200.00. As we have also expended during the last few months approximately \$500.00 for pure-bred milk cows for this School, and were confronted at the close of last year with a heavy cash expenditure in excess of cash receipts from all sources, including the per capita grants, you will understand the circumstances which have prompted our Commission to solicit your help in the purchase of the seed drill.






Reverend Sir:

Dear Sir,

With regard to our conversation re the Milk herd at Old Sun School, I have made investigation and beg to report as follows:

The Herd belonging to the School prior to 1927 was made up of 5 scrub milch cows, some bought in the stock yards at Calgary. Two of them were defective, one was of Holstein and Jersey stock, another was more or less of pure holstein breed, and the other just scrub. In 1927 the Indian Commission of the M.S.C.C. sold the two defectives and bought two pure bred Holstein cows to replace them. In addition to this they bought a pure bred Holstein bull which we now have. The scrub cow was traded for a holstein heifer later on.

This makes our present herd to consist of one old more or less Holstein, one half Jersey and Holstein, and three pure bred Holstein cows. The natural increase of these consists of five heifers, one just over a year old, and the others younger.

You will see by this that our effective strength is four good cows and one old one which will soon be useful only for breeding purposes. Our increase has been fairly normal, but the heifers are too young to be producers for the next year at least.

Now the situation that I am trying to handle is this. Within a few weeks we shall have from 80 to 90 children in this school, all of them having been living at home for over a year and in consequence under nourished. When we receive them, we shall be immediately faced with the problem of building them up to normal strength, for unless they are in good health, our time will be wasted in trying to educate them.

I thoroughly discussed the care of the children with Dr. Windsor, our Indian Reserve M.O., and she was most emphatic about the desirability of being able to give each child at least one pint of whole milk and one ounce of good butter as a minimum ration (daily).

Upon this basis we would need 13 gallons of whole milk, and 7 pounds of butter daily to provide a minimum ration for children and staff. Then, taking our present rate of production as a basis of calculation, we would require 7 cows to produce the whole milk, and 5 from which to make butter. That means that we ought to have at least a dozen cows to give us our minimum supply.

You will note that I only asked for six new cows to make our herd up to eleven. I did this because I thought that with a little more care we might possibly increase our supply per cow a little over what it now is. Assuming that this is a possibility I made the requisition as an absolute minimum.

SIR:-

Answering yours of the 30th ult. in reference to the milch herd at Old Sun School. I attach hereto a letter from the Principal of the school and I believe you will find it to be a satisfactory explanation of the existing condition of the herd. All animals are T.B. tested and the herd is now certified by the Department of Agriculture as being free from t.b. When the animals were first tested, two re-acted and had to be destroyed.

More milch cows will be needed to supply the milk when the pupils return. Rev. Mr. House has lately assumed his new duties and I have confidence in him. If the M.S.C.C. cannot supply him with more cows, we cannot expect the pupils to get all the milk they should have. In such event, I recommend that the Department purchase the cows. In this connection, I beg to submit that the Holstein breed is not my choice of breed for this school. What is needed is a dual purpose breed and if I were making the purchase, I would try to get milking Shorthorns or some breed which can be readily beefed.

Milch herds which are T.B. tested are limited in these parts - in fact, it may be necessary to go out of the Province to locate fresh milk cows of the type required. Whether it be the Department or the M.S.C.C. that purchase the cows, arrangements to do so should be made right away.

Reverend Sir:

Additions to the milch herd at the Old Sun Indian Residential School have been engaging the attention of the Department. It appears that six additional cows should be secured, and it has been recommended that dual purpose Short-horns be selected. I have informed Mr. Indian Agent Goederham that the Department will supply three such animals if your Society will purchase a like number. The general practice is for the Department to ask the school management to make necessary replacements to live stock. At most schools, the natural increase keeps the herd at required strength. However, in view of the circumstances at the Old Sun School, the Department makes the foregoing offer.

Dear Sir:-

I have received your letter of the 15th. inst. #104-1-14, in which you inform me that you have authorized Mr. Indian Agent Gooderham to purchase three cows for the Old Sun School. Only last week I received a letter from the Principal of this school dealing, in detail, with the whole question of the herd of stock now on the school premises. In reply to his communication, our Commission instructed me to authorize the Principal to take the matter up direct with the local Indian Agent, and to arrange, so far as possible, for the building up of a herd of pure-bred Holsteins. For some time our Commission desired to have at this school a herd of Shorthorns, or a dual purpose strain of stock, but the Indian Commissioner favoured the Holsteins and consequently a goodly number of Holstein animals are there at present. It seemed to our Commission that considerable expense would have to be incurred to make a complete change of the herd, and consequently it would be better to adhere to the one breed instead of having a mixture. The Principal has been authorized by our Commission to exchange some of the animals for Holsteins, and I trust that your Department may authorize Mr. Gooderham to purchase three good Holsteins as well. An authorization from your Department to Mr. Gooderham and the Principal to take whatever steps they consider best in the matter, will be much appreciated by our Commission.

Re attached voucher - the writer scoured the country for suitable fresh milch cows for Old Sun School during the past two months and found it impossible to locate them. Only T.B. tested animals were acceptable.

Mr. Durno, Calgary Auctioneer, scouted about and advised me of a sale of milch cows at Calgary on the 3rd. inst. He checked over the herd when I attended the sale and six of them were purchased. The school has just taken in 60 children and needed the milk. I would prefer dual purpose Shorthorns but as there were none available, Holsteins were secured.

The demand for milch cows at present is heavy and prices are higher than last year. It is hoped that the herd may be gradually made up of dual purpose Shorthorns. This may be possible in the coming summer.

You will note that one-half of the account is to be paid by the School authorities. I trust that all is in order.
