I beg to acknowledge your letter of October 6, #133-0-5, re voucher #206, for \$32.90 for repairs to the Range in the school kitchen. Voucher in favor of Neale & Yates. And in reply I wish to say that the stove was so badly burned out in the fire box that it was impossible to go on without these repairs. There was no opportunity of making requisition of the Department as the work simply had to be done to keep the stove in use.

I might further add that when the stove was purchased following expert advice a one-fire-place stove was secured. With the amount of cooking that has to be done in a school of this size one fire has to be kept at almost full force a great deal of the time to accomplish what is required and this stove perhaps for this reason has not stood up satisfactorily. I asked Mr. Yates sometime ago to ascertain from the Foundry Company if some change could be made in the stove that another fire place could be inserted. But have not yet received his reply.

When information comes or we get any new light on the matter I will communicate with you in regard to it.



Dear Sir:

I have your letter of September 28th #133-0-5, re voucher #200 for \$55.70 in favor of the Boyd Electric Company for material supplied and work done.

I have taken this matter up with the Electric Company and have gone over the details in regard to material and work. They have charged \$1.10 an hour for their electrician and 85 cents an hour for their helper. Twenty hours work was done.

Since the new building was erected I have tried to have my mechanic take care of this work as far as possible and it appears that some things had been neglected and other things improperly done. We therefore, had to have a checking up throughout all the buildings, putting in switches and other appliances which had gone out of order. I am quite convinced that all the work was necessary and some of it long over due.

I wish also to assure you that we are anxious to cooperate with the Department in the keeping of expense for repairs as low as possible, consistent with what will be economy in the long run and efficiency and safety in connection especially with the electrical department.



Dear Sir:

In reply to your letter of Oct. 6th, #133-0-5, re Windmill I beg to say that I cannot ascertain the length of time this mill has been in use but I would think seven or eight years or possibly more. It was used for pumping water to the tank in the old school. And I believe gave good satisfaction. It has been out of use since building operations commenced but as far as I can see is in good condition.

This windmill will not be needed in the future as an electrical pump has been installed and it is not now connected with our system.

The highest estimate of value that I has secured from a local dealer is \$35.00. They claim it will cost around \$35.00 to \$50.00 to disemle and reassemble it on other premises. Mr. McPherson came in this morning, looked it over and volunteered an offer of \$50.00. My judgment would be that he's offering full value.

I might further add that the south side of the tower is settling into the ground, so that the top of the mill is between three and four feet of plumb, ultimately the mill would have to be removed for safety.



Reverend Sir:

With reference to your letter of the 27th ultimo, regarding trouble you are having with cockroaches in the pantry and kitchen at the Brandon Indian Residential School, I beg to say that Bulletin No. 112 of the Department of Agriculture suggests the following:-

"Cockroaches may be readily controlled by means of sodium fluoride. This material should be lightly dusted in places frequented by the roaches such as about sinks, baseboards, cupboards, hot water pipes, etc. The sodium fluoride adheres to the legs and antennae of the roaches, and in cleaning themselves the insects are poisoned by it. Sodium fluoride retains its effectiveness and may be left undisturbed as long as convenient or until the cockroaches have completely disappeared. As this chemical is somewhat poisonous reasonable precautions should be taken to prevent children or domestic pets from gaining access to it.

"Two other materials which form the basis of many proprietary roach powders and which often are recommended, are pyrethrum and borax. Pyrethrum insect powder is less effective than sodium fluoride, it loses its effectiveness quickly on exposure to air, and has to be used in larger quantity. Borax, also, is less satisfactory than sodium fluoride. It is easily obtainable, however, and mixed with equal parts of powdered sweet chocolate, is a fairly effective remedy. Superheating and fumigation with hydrocyanic acid gas are also effective in destroying cockroaches. In the case of hydrocyanic acid gas fumigation, however, our experiments indicate that a concentration of gas produced by using 1½ lbs. of calcium cyanide per 1,000 cubic feet, although effective against nymphs and adults, does not destroy the eggs."

In sizing up the difficulty we have had in the past with boys and girls snatching little opportunities to meet each other we find that if a gate were placed across the hall at the foot of the girl's stairs preventing them from going down the hall, which passes by both dining rooms, four store rooms, the kitchen, two pantries, the laundry and reaches to the furnace room, that it would solve a great deal of our difficulty. I have enquired in a number of places where a suitable gate of this kind could be secured at a reasonable price and found the most satisfactory results in every way, could be secured by having Mr. A.L. Campbell make one out of galvanized iron pipe, and the heavy woven wire, such as is used for cages in banks, burglar proof gates, etc. To install this gate a plank has to be fastened into the solid brick wall to hang it onto and a suitable stop arranged on the frame of the first door going into the staff dining room. The cost of this is \$18.50. We will supply the varnish for the plank and woodwork required at the other end of the gate, we will also, put on the lock and clasp necessary.





for one to read. When the house was constructed no beam filling was done. The cornice boards have evidently never fitted properly and have so shrunken or warped so that there is an opening from about half an inch to an inch and a half around the whole building. Then there is nothing but lath and plaster covering the upstairs rooms. This is ample explanation for the abnormal coldness of the upstairs, notwithstanding the fact that the house has an oversized furnace and consumes a great deal of coal.

I had Mr. Wade of Messrs. Wade & Sons, look at it the other day and he suggests that a coat of insulax be spread between the joists over the whole attic surface. This would cost without the labor a little over a Hundred Dollars. It seems too bad to put this much expense on the building if it was only to be used for a year or so. For a temporary job he further suggested that fine shavings mixed with sawdust and slack lime might be used to give temporary relief. The cost of this would not be more than Fifteen or Twenty Dollars and we could do that work ourselves. The objection to this method is that the filling used is so inflammable that it makes it undesirable but there is only one chimney going up through the roof and it is of good brick construction and very little danger would exist.
