





"THAT this General Board of Missions expresses its hearty appreciation of the substantial commencement made by the Department of Indian Affairs in the construction of new buildings for the plant at the Coqualeetza Institute, - but inasmuch as the main building is in a very unsatisfactory, if not dangerous, condition we respectfully urge upon the Department the imperative necessity that provision be made at the next session of Parliament for the completion of the main building in 1923, and that a copy of this resolution be sent to the Superintendent General of Indian Affairs."

The next concern is the formal opening and while it is the prerogative of the Department to express its desires both as to time, personel and other arrangements, I feel sure I can write freely, without presuming, in reference to the matter and should any suggestion I may offer meet with your approval I should be pleased:-







## NEW INDIAN SCHOOL OPENED



CHILLIWACK, Oct. 21.—Built at a cost of \$125,000 by the Dominion Government, the new Coqualeetza Institute at Sardis for the education of Indians was formally opened by C. E. Manning, general secretary of the Missionary Society of the Methodist Church, this afternoon in the presence of a large and distinguished audience at 2:30. Tomorrow afternoon from 3 to 5 and 7:30 to 10 p.m. the I. O. D. E. will present a set of war memorial pictures and the institution will be thrown open to the public for inspection.

The new school is the result of the ideals and self-sacrifice of the early missionaries as it was 36 years ago when Mrs. C. M. Tate took into her home a few Indian children and established the first Indian day school. Later she established the first mission residence with 12 pupils and in 1893 the first Coqualeetza Institute was built. In 1920 the old building was deemed inadequate and the Federal Government through the Indian department planned the present magnificent and modern building through the sale of unoccupied Indian lands.

The name Coqualeetza means "place of cleaning" and was given to the district by the Indians who, once a year, assembled on the Vedder River to wash their blankets.

At present there are more than 200 Indian boys and girls being educated in the new school.






