

The last suggestion is one by the Fire Chief who has seen it in use in many places. Both the Principal, Fire Chief Adams and myself discussed the matter from all angles, and the suggestions which I have just detailed meets entirely with their approval and covers the objections that both of them had to other suggestions.

I believe, and so do those concerned, that these changes can be made by a local dealer at a reasonable cost. It is just possible that he might have to get a further length of steps, but I do not know unless measurements are taken. I should suggest that Mr. Agent Small be instructed to get a builder to lay an estimate before you along the lines suggested.

Fire escape - additional facilities. It is a valuable building with inadequate fire protection. There has been considerable correspondence with the Department, but no instructions have ever been issued to have a report made and submitted to the Department.

Roof of the engine-room is leaky, and badly needs repairs.

A Frigidair refrigerator is desired, as they are unable to keep ice owing to the fact that the first warm sun melts it very quickly, and it is difficult to keep meats, butter, and other perishable products.

Original in the hands of Commissioner Ditchburn who is to interview Inspector Pragnell on the subject mentioned and deal with the question from the Commissioner's Office.


Sir:

I wish to refer to your report of June 21st, concerning the Kootenay Indian Residential School. Mr. Commissioner Ditchburn is being authorized to communicate with you with reference to the change in the fire escapes. Please see that the Rev. Principal takes advantage of Fire Chief Adams' offer to assist in the training of the children in fire drill. You may also accept their proposal that the Fire Department refill the extinguishers at 50¢ each, once per year, and you should thank Mr. Adams for his offer to use the old liquid in the fire extinguishers for instructional purposes.

The need of a refrigerator at this school is being noted for estimates. I am today writing to Mr. Indian Agent Small, with reference to the roof of the engine room, which should be repaired.

Dear Mr. Ditchburn:

I wish to refer to the conversation which Reverend Father Choinel had with Honourable Dr. King, concerning improvements at the Kootenay Indian Residential School. I believe that the original of a memorandum in this connection was left with you. I now find that Mr. Inspector Pragnell's report of June 21st on fire escapes at this institution has been inadvertently overlooked. Our Inspector recommends that the present fire escapes should be removed to the two end elevations at the school, where they could be properly fixed. He recommends that they lead from the centre window of the two elevations. This appears to be the best suggestion that has yet reached the Department in this connection, and I have to ask you to inform Mr. Pragnell that his scheme has been approved. Please authorize him to get a competent builder to make the necessary change in these fire escapes. I am returning the plan which Mr. Pragnell forwarded with his report. You might ask him to return this to the Department when the work has been satisfactorily completed.





I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 12th ultimo with reference to changes in the fire escapes at the Kootenay Indian School as recommended by Mr. Inspector Pragnell on the 21st of June.

I note in your letter you state that you are returning the plan which Mr. Pragnell forwarded with his report. In this connection I may say only the blue print was attached to your letter. However, I observe in Inspector Pragnell's report dated 21st June he makes mention of the necessity for changing the fire escapes, but stated he was submitting separately his suggestions which meet with the approval of the Rev. Principal. I take it that the blue print is to be considered as the report.

As requested, I have taken the matter up with Mr. Inspector Pragnell informing him that his suggestions have been approved and he is authorized to get a competent builder to make the necessary changes in the fire escapes. In the event of his having sent in a special report on this matter he will, no doubt, have a copy of the same for his guidance.



Sir:- Re-Water system Kootenay Residential School.

The Reverend Principal, Father Choiñell of the Kootenay Residential School has drawn a rough sketch, which I herewith enclose, and has asked me to apply to the Department to have the water system in the School thoroughly gone into by an Engineer with a view to improving the same.

At the present time the water pumped from the St. Mary's River is condemned on account of the Consolidated Mining and Smelting Co. at Kimberley operating a Concentrator on the Stream above the School property. This necessitates water for domestic purposes being carried from a Spring 400 yards away. St. Joseph's Creek ~~that is~~ giving gravity is also condemned, and can only be used for cleaning and fire protection.

This, you will understand is purely an engineering proposition, and should be gone into by a man qualified to make a report.

Will you kindly authorize the proper parties to have this report made as soon as it is possible, as the health of the pupils depends a great deal of good pure water.

The Department is advised by Indian Agent Small of Cranbrook that the source of water supply at the Kootenay Indian Residential School has become polluted through the existence of a smelter at Kimberley, above the intake of the water work system on the St. Mary's River.

As there is no other source in the vicinity available, which might be used to supply water to the above mentioned institution, I would recommend that the Dominion Water Power Branch be requested to investigate the present situation, in order that the Department might be advised as to the best way of remedying the existing condition.







Dear Sir:-

I beg to enclose for your kind consideration and if it meets with your approval for forwarding to the Secretary of Indian affairs three plans of desks arrangements in the class rooms at the Kootenay Residential School, together with a requisition for school material with reference to the same.

You are aware that at the beginning of the school-year, last September, in order to obtain a greater efficiency we have added another teacher to the staff. This last teacher has had so far no real accomodation for her twenty pupils, other than common benches which do not afford any comfort or help to the pupils during the class hours; the teacher has no desk wherein to put anything in safety from the children.

We have nearly enough desks in the other two classrooms to accommodate all the pupils, by a judicious rearrangement and division of such between the three classrooms. In order to meet the requirements of all, we will need the desks described in the Requisition Form.

It will be seen that we ask mostly for FRONTS and REARS, as those are not in hand at all at the present time and thereby the front of the desk at the head of the class is practically useless, also the rear of the last one in the row.

Trusting this will meet with your approval, and that you will be able to secure a favorable answer from the Department.
