


Legal Subdivisions in a Section



CEDAR LAKE SHEET



Extracts from letter of Rev. L. Laronde, Principal
of The Mackay School, The Pas.

I have come to the conclusion that it will be to the best interests of the school, to divide the amount of land the department would be willing to grant into two lots: that instead of one hay-reserve to set aside two for the school, one close at hand on the Saskatchewan and the other as a last resort, further away on the Carrot River. I have ventured to mark the suggested hay-lands on the map you sent me, marked hay-reserve Nos. 1 & 2.

Hay Reserve No. 1 would be seven miles up the Saskatchewan from the school, and would be at a convenient distance from the school, as compared with Hay-reserve No. 2 on the Carrot River which is about thirty miles from the School. A well defined ridge runs at right angles to the River and another ridge runs parallel for quite a distance. A line drawn East and West from a point half a mile from North end of Big Island would mark the South boundary.

An interval of about three weeks elapses between the word of a flood at Edmonton and it's arrival on the School here, and there is a further interval of over two weeks before a particular hay-field marked Hay-Reserve No. 1 is flooded; as lands are flooded not by the overflow of the banks of the river but by the coming up of the water from the rear. In this case, say the month of July, by ignoring our own flats, and going to this hay-field, on receipt of word of a flood, we could get the hay and have it all stacked on the River-bank in good time.

Hay Reserve No. 2 would be located on the Carrot River, on twenty-three miles from The Pas, on the West side of the river, about a mile above the Creek named Waskwei on the Map. The hay-lands are further up on the North bank. This hay-field is very fertile, and it's only drawback is its distance from the school, which should be dependable.

EXTRACT FROM ditto FOR DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT
GENERAL.

To insure the successful harvest of our hay in the future, we would require a scow for the transport of our hay, as with it we could be independent of the transportation which cannot be depended upon in emergencies. The Department should be able to provide us with a barge for freighting purposes, suitable for carrying horses.

If the Department granted us the necessary lumber for a scow, we could get our hay would be justified, not only by the expense of the hay, but also in vexatious delays.

In reply to that letter then, I am sending you by the same mail the map Mr. McLean sent me, with the Hay-Reserves^{ed} which we ask for marked on it, as requested by Mr. McLean. I enclose with this letter Extracts from the letter of Rev. L. Laronde, explaining the map and the reasons for his choice. Mr. McLean promised to make application to The Department of the Interior on receipt of Map. Will you be kind enough to see that this is done and to speak a word on our behalf.







Your letter No. 373371/1, of date the 16th instant received giving me authority to buy one hundred tons of hay, and in regard to the latter clause of same re clearing the twenty acres of stumps and stones. I went into this matter fully with the Principal on the 26th of July, and the estimate of the cost of clearing the 20 acres of stones and stumps, which is already cleared of ~~stones and stumps~~ the bush, was \$ 400.00. This is one of the jobs that can not be very closely figured on, and it would be almost impossible at the present time to get anyone to figure on a job of this kind. Mr Laronde can do this work cheaper than anyone else on account of the boys cheap labour.

I would recommend that the sum of \$ 400.00 be granted for this work, the account for the expenditure to be certified to by the Agent I have instructed the Principal to haul all the stone to the point on the Island where the bridge to the mainland will be erected at a later date. There is a low bank on the Island side which requires filling and the large quantities of stone to be removed can be used for making an embankment at that point.


