On November 10th 1922, an Order-in-Council (No. 34/2365) was passed awarding the contract for the construction of a cold storage building for Cowessess Indian Boarding School to the lowest tenderer, Mr. Frank Westman, for the amount of \$1,100.

I find that on April 30th last, cheque No. 570 was issued in favour of Fred W. Terry for the amount of \$570.06, being the first payment for the erection of the above mentioned building. Kindly inform me why, when the contract was awarded by Council to Frank Westman, payment is made to Fred W. Terry.

The certificate in support of this payment was made out in your department by Mr. Orr, your architect. I presume that the amount certified to by him is based on a report sent in by the officer of your department who is charged with the supervision of the work at the school. If such is the case Mr. Orr's certificate for payment should be supported by a copy of such report.

Dear Sir,

I have your letter of the 14th. instant with reference to the contract for the erection of the cold-storage building in connection with the Cowessess Indian boarding school.

In reply I beg to say that this contract was awarded Mr. Frank Westman for the sum of \$1,100.00. Between the time of the acceptance of his tender and passing of the necessary Order in Council, our agent informed us that Mr. Westman had left Grayson, Sask. and gone to reside at the coast, and that his business was being conducted by Mr. F. W. Terry, who signed the contract as his agent. Mr. Terry successfully completed the work and payments were made to him.

I trust this explanation will be satisfactory. I may say that Mr. MacKenzie showed the original papers to Mr. Reid yesterday. Payments were made on the certificate of our Architect, based upon reports of the agent; these also were shown to Mr. Reid. I shall ask the Architect, however, to bear in mind the fact that when he makes payments of this kind a copy of the report of our agent or other officer should accompany the progress certificate.





I have your letter of the 29th ulto., and I note that the school authorities have been pressing for laundry equipment for the Cowessess Residential School.

The last time I was at this school they had a power washing machine and I heard no complaints about it. However, it may have worn out or they may have transferred it to another school.

Do you think it is necessary to buy an Extractor? One was asked for at the File Hills School and I refused to give it to them, but if you think they should have them at both these schools you will let me know and I will be glad to make the recommendation.


I think it would be better for me to have a report from one of our inspectors as to what is really necessary before making a recommendation. It might be some weeks, however, before this could be done.


I have your No. 304-11 A of the 4th instant, regarding the laundry equipment required for the use of the Cowessess Indian Residential School.



Dear Mr. Scott:-



Referring to your letter of the 29th of September, and my reply of the 4th of October, I beg to say that I have gone into the matter of laundry machinery, etc. for the Cowesses Boarding School. I find that the Washing Machine which they have there is still in use, but to get repairs for it would be an expensive matter. I, therefore, feel like recommending the purchase of one Power Washing Machine, size 30" x 40", and four enamel wash tubs instead of six.

I would also recommend the purchase of one sewing machine, and one bread oven. The bread oven is badly needed and the cost would be somewhere between \$250 and \$300.

If I receive your authority to make these purchases I will invite competition, except where a special make of article is required.

In addition to the above the Principal makes a request to be supplied with a set of Exide Batteries, 16 in number, costing \$230.00. These are for his lighting plant.



We are advised by Rev. J. Carrière, Grayson, Sask. that the Number 3 Special Economy Oven ordered by your department on October 31st last, will not go in the building, for the reason that it is too wide for the doors, that is 36 inches.

We regret such an inconvenience, and would ask you your advise in such a case.

We understand that you have a blue print showing measurements of these ovens, and that you are well aware that they are 36 inches wide and shipped erected.

Unless you have another demand for such an oven, we may send our mechanic to Marieval (Grayson) to knock down and rebuild oven in kitchen, but same will cost approximately Sixty dollars (\$60.00) including travelling expenses.


Gentlemen:

I have your letter of the 10th instant, reporting that the No. 3 Special Economy oven ordered for the Cowessess Indian Residential School, Grayson, Sask., will not go into the building for the reason that it is too wide for the doors.

In reply I beg to say that this is the same type of oven as was supplied by your firm for a number of our residential schools, and while we did not have any definite information as to the width of the doors at the Cowessess school through which the oven was to be taken, it was considered when the order was placed that there would be no difficulty in taking it into the building. As suggested by you, it will be necessary to send one of your mechanics to Grayson to knock down and rebuild the oven in the kitchen, and I shall be pleased if you will arrange to have a mechanic sent to the school at the earliest possible date. We note that you estimate the cost to be approximately \$60, including travelling expenses. We are informing the Principal of the school accordingly, and requesting him to give your man every assistance in the work. Please prepare an account, in duplicate, covering the extra cost in taking down and rebuilding the oven and for the travelling expenses of the mechanic. This account you should forward in the same manner as the account covering the cost of the oven.



In this connection I may say that this is the same type and size of oven as was supplied by this firm for a number of our other Indian residential schools, and there never was any difficulty in having the other ovens placed in the school buildings. We are requesting the above firm to send a mechanic to the school to knock down and rebuild the oven in the kitchen. They state that they will do this work for approximately \$60, including the travelling expenses of the mechanic. We are requesting them to send their mechanic as soon as possible, and I shall be pleased if you will give him any assistance you can in the work of installing the oven.




