lessened and removed.


Thus with the staff and students work-



This sums it all up for the girls' sport till we meet again. Good luck to all!



Nov. 27 The grade XII classroom was the scene of a Provincial Teachers' Local meeting.



# MILITIA CADETS

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On September 18, a number of former cadets and newcomers showed up for the start of another season in military training. The purpose of this training is to familiarize them in the army life, teach them discipline, and to train leaders for the future years. The officers and instructors are Captain E. Aubry, chief instructor, Captain Eldon Bellegarde, and the backbone of the corps, C.S.M. (Company Sergeant Major) Roger McArthur. The Cadet Company is composed of three platoons and manned by nine officers and other ranks. Their training consists of map-making, foot-drill, rifle drill, national survival and first aid. The motto for the cadets is "acer ascerari" which means "as the maple so the sapling".

The Y.S.T.F. (Young Soldiers Training Plan) or the militia commenced on the same day as the cadets. Twenty five militia recruits were combined to form the second platoon of "B" Company, Regina Rifle Regiment. The first platoon consists of twenty veterans from last year. Company Commander for the company is Captain Butler, assisted by his NCO's (non commissioned officers) which include sergeants Cochrane and Jeannotte, corporals Ledoux, Frank, Carrier, and Anequod. The recruits were officially enrolled on October 26 by the recruiting team from Regina. Their training consists of map-making, rifle drill, and national survival.

On Remembrance Day, the militia and the cadets together with the Lebreton Legion formed a church parade. After mass the whole congregation paraded through the streets to the Veterans' Hall. Wreaths were placed at the foot of the cenotaph for the commemoration of the men and women who courageously gave their lives for freedom in the past war. After the wreaths were placed, the flags were lowered to half mast. Members of the school band played the "Last Post". After the recitation of "In Flanders Field" by a veteran, all withdrew. As a conclusion to this we recall the motto of the Regina Rifle Regiment "Dieu et mon Droit", "God and my Right".

One of the highlights during the parade on October 23, was the official presentation of the "Tom Longboat Trophy" to Mr. Art. Obey by Mr. MacLeod, the new Indian Inspector for the File Hills - Qu'Appelle Agency.
