

Dear Sir: re: Inspection of Boilers and Machinery,
Indian Residential School, Lytton, B.C.

On July 24th, 1933, I inspected the plant of this school,
which consists of,

Two Birchfield Boilers 7' x 8' x 4'6", having 64
3" tubes, rated 43 H.P. each, numbered 44028 B.C.
and 44029 B.C., built in 1928, making them now 5
years old. Longitudinal joint welded.

One Inglis Supreme boiler, 80" x 80" x 42", having
53 - 3" tubes rated at 34 H.P., No. 44564 B.C., built
in 1931, making it now 3 years old. Longitudinal
joint welded.

One Vertical tubular boiler 67" x 31" having 43
2 3/4" tubes and rated at 8.3 H.P., built in 1927,
making it now 6 years old. Longitudinal joint double
rivetted lap. Boiler No. 44008 B.C.

Boiler No. 44028 B.C.

I gave this boiler a careful hammer test and found that all
stays, plates and joints were in good condition. I then gave
it a Hydrostatic Test of 40 Lb. and found everything tight.

The internal condition of this boiler is very good, there
being no corrosion.

The safety valve works freely and will blow off at 15 Lb.
pressure.

The fusible plug has been renewed.

Test cocks, water gauge, main stop valve, blow off cock and
pipe are in good condition. The steam gauge is correct.

Boiler No. 44029 B.C.

This boiler is in much the same condition as 44028 B.C. except
the blow off cock, which is leaking and needs to be overhauled.
The steam gauge is about 1 Lb. light.

The bridge walls of both these boilers have been rebuilt and are
in good condition. Some of the nipples of the hot water coils
installed in the furnaces are leaking slightly and should receive
attention.

Boiler No. 44029 B.C. Continued.

On account of the hardness of the feed water a water softening apparatus has been installed for the laundry. I would suggest that only water from this apparatus be used as make up feed water.

I have issued certificates for these boilers, allowing a steam pressure of 15 Lb. and condition good.

Boiler No. 44008 B.C.

I gave this boiler a careful hammer test and found that all joints, plates and rivets were in good condition. I then gave it a Hydrostatic Test of 190 Lb. per square inch and found every part quite tight. I then set the safety valve to blow off at 135 Lb.

The steam gauge is 15 Lb. light and should be renewed.

The test cocks, water gauge, blow off cock, are in good condition.

The fusible plug is to be renewed.

Internally the boiler is in good condition, very little scale showing.

I have issued a certificate allowing a steam pressure of 135 Lb. and condition good.

Boiler No. 44564 B.C.

This boiler is also in first class condition externally and internally. The Main stop valve was leaking so badly that I could not complete the Hydrostatic Test. This boiler is fitted with a scum pan or surface blowdown but there is no cock fitted on the outside of the boiler so it can be used. A screwed plug being screwed into the connection this should be fitted with an asbestos packed blow down cock so that it can be used.

The fusible plug is to be renewed.

The bridge is in good condition and will need no attention.

I would like to point out that when this boiler was installed it was installed in a deep pit and no provision was made for draining it. This must be attended to as under present conditions should a leak occur the attendant would very likely be badly burnt before he could get out and the steam and boiling water would prevent him from drawing the fires and the boiler would be practically ruined. To put in a drain would cost about One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00).

I have issued a certificate allowing a steam pressure of 15 Lb. and condition good.

Laundry.

The machines are kept in good condition. There should be a pipe guard placed around the washing and drying machines which I pointed out to the engineer. Some of the materials required are at the school and the rest will cost about Ten Dollars (\$10.00).

We are trying to finish the work at "47", which we contemplated doing over the year, and still have the barn and coralls to erect. I find that it will be impossible for me to get same done with our own gang, as I have been running with a very close minimum of help, and would like very much if the Department could see fit to allow a grant of \$200.00, taken from the New England Company's Departmental funds for wages so that I can employ preferably Indians to do this work. I might also need 2000 or 3000 feet of lumber which would be an additional cost of \$60.00, making the Grant \$260.00 in all.

Please take this up with the Department at your very earliest.



Dear Mr. Strang:-

The pipe line which supplies the barn with water has again broken out very badly -- in fact, there are five leaks. I approached the Department some time ago for renewal of this pipe line, and was then refused. I have since that time been able to carry through, but find that directly we patch one place, another breaks out, and the line will have to be taken right out and reconstructed.

Last Spring I was able to purchase some 400' of 2" iron pipe and 300' of 1 1/2" iron pipe, which could be used to replace the present wooden pipe line, but it is not enough to go through to the tank, which amount of pipe would carry us about half way between the barn and the tank. I would like therefore, if possible, the Department to allow us a Grant of \$100.00 with which to buy pipe and an extra \$100 (cost of installation) making \$200.00 in all expended on this work.

I should be able to purchase some second-hand pipe in Vancouver which would do this work very nicely, and would be a permanent job. Kindly take this up with the Department at your earliest.






I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 19th instant, enclosing letter of the 18th instant from the Principal of St. George's Indian Residential School.

Mr. Arnall, Engineer of the Department of Public Works, who inspected the boilers and machinery at the St. George's Indian Residential School in July, last, has forwarded a report of his inspection to this Department. He has drawn attention to the condition of the boilers at this school and the repairs required, as follows:-

Boiler No. 44029. The blow-off cock, which is leaking, needs to be overhauled. The steam gauge is about 1 lb. light. Some of the nipples of the hot water coils are leaking slightly and should receive attention.

Boiler No. 44008. The steam gauge is 15 lb. light and should be renewed. The fusible plug is to be renewed.

Boiler No. 44564. This boiler is in first class condition externally and internally. The main stop valve was leaking so badly that I could not complete the hydrostatic test. This boiler is fitted with a scum pan or surface blowdown, but there is no cock fitted on the outside of the boiler so it can be used. A screwed plug is screwed into the connection and this should be fitted with an asbestos packed blow-down cock so that it can be used. The fusible plug is to be renewed. This boiler was installed in a deep pit and no provision was made for draining. This must be attended to, as, under present conditions, should a leak occur, the attendant would very likely be badly burnt before he could get out and the steam and boiling water would prevent him from drawing the fires and the boiler would be practically ruined. To put in a drain would cost about \$100.

You should draw the above to the attention of the Principal and he should arrange to see that the repairs, as mentioned by the Public Works Engineer, are attended to at an early date. The cost should be met by the school authorities from per capita grant or other receipts.

Quotations for this are to hand from the Crane Manufacturing Company, and renewal will cost \$90.00. I would be glad also, if the Department could see their way clear to handle this for us.







With reference to the electric ironer, blankets and mattress covers asked for by the Principal, I have to say there are no funds available to cover the cost of purchasing this equipment.


Regarding the purchase of a new hot water jacket heater, I have to say that the Department will approve of an expenditure not exceeding the sum of \$90 in supplying this heater. After this article has been installed, you should forward an account, in triplicate, properly certified, covering the cost. Please state thereon that payment is to be made from Trust Account, No. 460.

I may say that the Department has authorized considerable expenditure for this school during the current fiscal year, and, unless repairs or the purchasing of equipment are of an urgent nature, it will be impossible to provide any further funds for the St. George's School this fiscal year, either from our Appropriation for Indian Education or from New England Company grant.

In connection with the Department letter handed to me last evening please note the following that:

- ✓ (1) Boiler #44029 has been cared for as asked by the inspector, that is, needs in leakage and in the steam guage has been made right.
- ✓ (2) Boiler #44008 steam guage 1 pound light has also been looked after and the fusible plugs have been changed.

(3) Boiler #44564 regarding the repairs in connection with the blowdown pan the arrangement that the inspector found on the boiler has been accepted by the Department as a perfect installation from the beginning and I do not feel that the school should be obliged to care for this expenditure. Also in connection with the provision for draining mentioned with an estimate cost of draining being \$100.00, this also was accepted by the Department and I do not feel that the burden of this expense should be placed upon the school. *Other repairs on the boiler has been done*

I might say definitely that the financial status of the school cannot stand such expenditure when in the first place the installation was accepted by the Department as measuring up to the necessary Dominion and Provincial provisions for heating facilities.

I shall be glad therefore to do this work if the Department can see fit to make the expenditure.
