

Reverend Sir,-

On your drug requisition of November 30th.

1. Five gallons of Cod Liver Oil is insufficient unless you have a stock on hand. To comply with the Department's directions you will require one gallon for every four pupils. You may have more on request.
2. Hydrogen Peroxide and Argyrol solution are freezable and cannot be shipped. You will receive capsules of Silvol from which you can make the solution.
3. I am not allowed to supply large quantities of Lysol to schools and am instructed that disinfectants should be purchased from School Funds. You will receive one gallon of Lysol which will make fifty gallons of antiseptic solution of effective strength.
4. "Ephedrin" drops is not a sufficient description of a substance which appears in many forms. If you must have it please purchase locally.

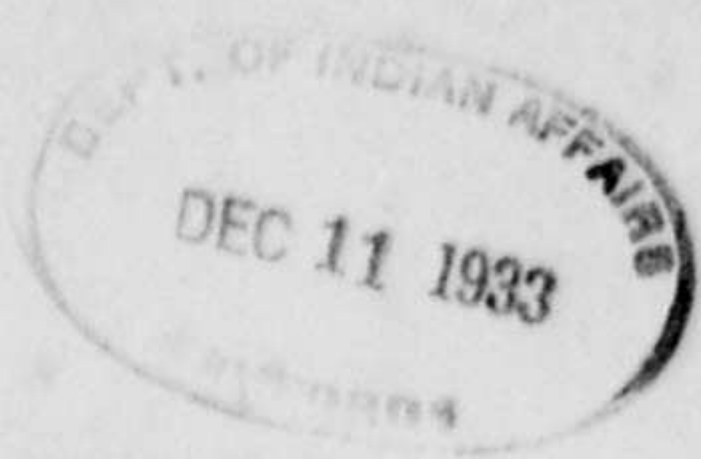



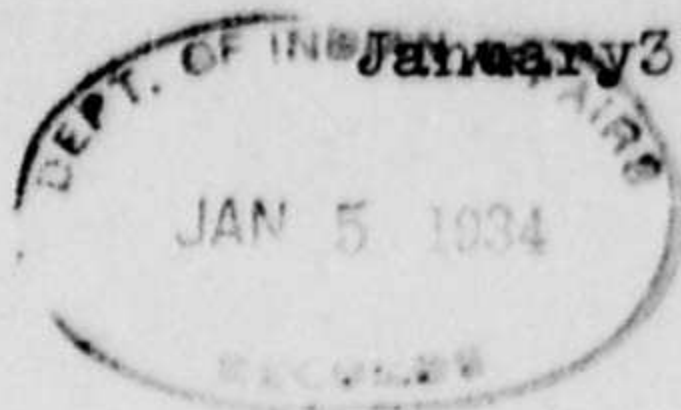

Since writing you concerning Matthew Thomas, We have a little more information. In view of the fact that a certain individual is doing considerable talking, and the information received from the Hospital yesterday that the kidney was removed and his condition only-fair, I think we had better give you the details as far as we know them.

On Friday Dec. 29th. the coasting was good and a great number were at it. This boy Matthew Thomas who is about fourteen years of age takes with him two boys, younger than himself, away from the crowd, and goes over back of the root-house, where the hill is very steep. At the bottom of the hill is a road and then another sharp drop to the marsh and the river. I might say the tendency to get apart from the crowd has been a consistent attitude of this boy, and along with boys much younger than himself.

On this occasion they had gone to a place which they knew I had forbidden ^{the} to go, principally on account of the steepness and roughness of the hill and the nearness of the river. When the accident happened the other boys put him on the sleigh and brought him up to fairly level ground where he got off and walked into the School. That was near supper time, and without saying anything went in and had supper. After supper he told Sister Margaret Patrice, the nurse, that he fell off his sleigh and that his elbow hurt his side. The truth is that he was thrown against

a fence pole or telephone pole and it certainly must have been with considerable force,. The Sister found the flesh slightly broken and put a dressing on . The next day he said he was sore and remained in bed. The following day he wanted to get up and he remained indoors all day. On New Years morning he left the chapel followed by the Sister, nurse. After seeing him to bed she noticed the blood in the toilet. We called the Doctor and on his advice took him by car to the Hospital.

The Doctor says that the boy told him that he had passed blood on frôday night, but if that is true , it is also true that the boy did not make it known to any one here. Being the age he is one would think that he would make it known.

This is the the case as far as I can find out from the Sister and the boys.

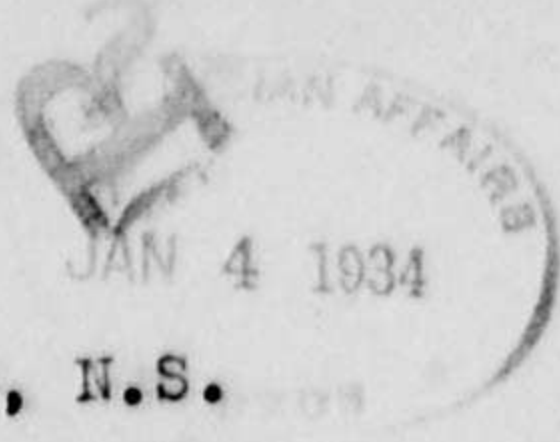

Mary Doucette, No. 03, was on the advice of the Doctor taken there on the evening of Dec. 26th. for observation, with the possibility of chronic appendix. They operated two days later and I saw her yesterday. She is doing well.

Matthew Thomas No. 27, got a bump while coasting and we brought him to the Hospital yesterday, Jan. 1st. We found about twenty four hours after the accident that he was pass-blood. Doctor McGinnis considered his condition serious, but at this time we have no word from the Hospital.

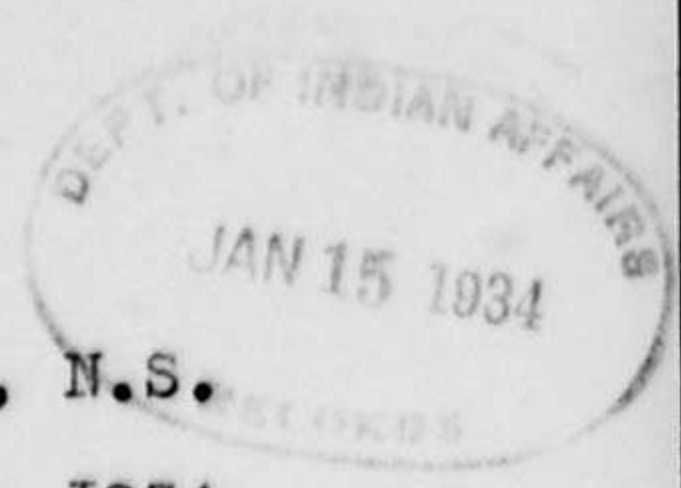
