JOHN BROOKS, age 13--Examined April 7, 1930, T. 99, P 88
R. 20 -- 9.45 a.m. Anterior cervical glands enlarged.

Flattening of left chest--Movements retarded--slight
dulness--Breathing diminished in lower half, absent at base.
Few scattered rales heard to 5 r. and 8 v.s.

Right side nothing special.

X-Ray plate shows marked parenchymatous involvement of
left upper lobe with evidence of collapse at base--Thickened
pleura.

Rt. side; moderate emphysema with slight parenchymatous
changes in upper lobe.

DIAGNOSIS - Pulmonary Tuberculosis.

RECOMMENDATION - A term of Sanatorium treatment.

ADA MACDONALD, age 12--Examined April 7, 1930, T 98, P 80,
R 20 -- 11.30 A.M.

Indefinite history of having spat up a small quantity
of blood a few months ago. Nutrition good.

On physical examination--nothing definitely abnormal found.

X-Ray plate shows diffuse mottling in left upper lobe
in first and second interspaces (anteriorly) which has the
appearance of being recent.

Right side -- nothing special.

DIAGNOSIS -- Pulmonary Tuberculosis.

RECOMMENDATION -- A term of Sanatorium treatment.

LOUISE PAUL, age 10.

Examined April 8, 1930, T. 99, P. 98, R. 20, -- 3 p.m.

Discharging right ear.

History of a considerable haemoptysis a few weeks ago.

Physical examination of chest did not reveal a lesion.

X-Ray plate shows some fibrosis of both upper lobes.

Small parenchymatous changes in first and second interspaces left side. Calcified node second interspace left side.

DIAGNOSIS - Min. Pulmonary Tuberculosis.

RECOMMENDATION - A term of Sanatorium treatment.

NICHOLAS DOHERTY, age 9.

Examined April 7, 1930, T. 98, P. 84, R. 20 - 10 a.m.

Personal history negative -- Family history not obtainable. Nutrition good. One enlarged anterior cervical gland. Breathing diminished at right base. Rales heard right middle lobe and upper part right lower lobe.

X-Ray shows minute parenchymatous infiltration in first and second interspaces on the right side.

Left side, heavy hilum with minute P.C. charges extending out from it in second and third interspaces.

DIAGNOSIS - Pulmonary Tuberculosis.

RECOMMENDATION - A term in Sanatorium.

MARY PICTON, age 18.

Examined April 8, 1930, T. 99.2, P. 84, R. 18 -- 4.25 p.m.

At age of eight years had "running sore" in neck--spat up clot of blood four years ago. Mother died of Tuberculosis. Scar on neck resembling scar from old suppurating tuberculous glands.

On physical examination a few dry rales were heard below left thoricle.

X-Ray plates show markedly thickened hili--several calcified nodes in hilar and peri--hilar regions. Slight organized parenchymatous changes in left apex, extending out to periphery in first interspace. Old infiltration, minute, in first and second interspaces, right side.

Two specimens of sputum stained--negative.

DIAGNOSIS --Pulmonary Tuberculosis apparently arrested.

RECOMMENDATION - A rest period of 1½ hours every afternoon (lying down) in a well ventilated room, case to be watched and re-examined from time to time. Another X-Ray plate next year.

GILBERT FRANCIS, age 11.

Examined April 7, 1930, T. 100, P. 92, R. 20 -- 10.15 a.m.

History of frequent colds.

Two enlarged anterior cervical glands. No definitely abnormal physical signs found in chest.

X-Ray plates show very heavy left hilum. Scattered calcified nodes right hilum and vicinity.

DIAGNOSIS - Glandular Tuberculosis -- Arrested Pulmonary Tuberculosis.

RECOMMENDATION - A daily, two hour rest period, lying down 3.30 - 5.30. Patient to be watched and repleted next year.

ELSIE CHARLES, age 13.

Examined April 8, 1930, T. 100, P. 92, R. 20 - 2.15 p.m.

Paternal history of Tuberculosis.

Personal history negative. A well nourished child.

Slight cardiac irregularity-Soft systolic apical murmur heard.
Physical examination of lungs within normal limits.

X-Ray shows old organized parenchymatous changes in second and third interspace right side. Slight beading on left side.

DIAGNOSIS - Min. Pulmonary Tuberculosis arrested.

RECOMMENDATION - An afternoon rest period of 1½ hours.

EDWARD SOCOLIN, age 14.

Examined April 7, 1930, T. 99, P. 78, R. 22 -- 10.45 a.m.

Says he put up about two teaspoonfuls of blood over a year ago.

Well nourished.

No definitely abnormal physical signs.

X-Ray shows suggestive of hilar infection. Bronchial markings accentuated both sides-Scattered beading both sides-Suspicious left apex. Diaphragms irregular.

DIAGNOSIS - Suspected Min. Tuberculosis.

RECOMMENDATION - Case to be watched and have follow up.

EXAMINATIONS - Replate next year. An hour afternoon rest desirable.

LUCY BROOKS, age 14.

Examined April 8, 1930, T. 99, P. 74, R. 20 -- 11.30 a.m.

History of pneumonia twice.

Spat up a half teaspoonful of blood several weeks ago.

Well nourished.

Breathing quite harsh, especially right side; somewhat diminished at left base.

X-Ray shows diffuse mottling of both upper lobes, particularly in the first interspace right side.

DIAGNOSIS - Questionable minimal Pulmonary Tuberculosis.

RECOMMENDATION - A short period of observation and study at Sanatorium.

JOSEPH JOHN FRANCIS, age 11.

Examined April 7, 1930, T. 99.5, P. 90, R. 20, -- 9.30 a.m.

Paternal history of tuberculosis.

Well nourished.

Chest sounds within normal limits.

X-Ray plate does not show anything special.

No evidence of Tuberculosis.

BEN TORREY, age 9. Examined April 8, 1930, T. 100, P. 90, R. 22
9.45 a.m.

Chest seems clear.

It is my opinion that this boy has Glandular Tuberculosis;
requiring no special treatment at present. The general excellent
care he is receiving at the school being sufficient.

CATHERINE ELLEN FRANCIS, age 6. Examined April 8, 1930, T. 100,
P. 96, R. 22 -- 3.15 p.m.

Chest clear.

Life Opinion Glandular Tuberculosis requiring no special treatment.
Present hygienic being sufficient.

RALPH McDONALD, age 7. Examined April 7, 1930.

No lesion found in chest or glands. I notice he has
an Umbilical Hernia for which a belt is being worn. As to any
remediable measures for this I leave to your decision.

ARTHUR McDONALD, age 8. Examined April 7, 1930.

No lesion found in chest or glands.

This boy (brother of Ralph) also has a small Umbilical
Hernia.

Referred for your opinion and decision.

EDWARD COPE, age 8.

Examined April 7, 1930, T. 100, P. 92, R. 22 -- 2.15 p.m.

Best cervical glands shoty. No lesion found in chest.

Generalized eruption resembling Chicken Pox. Child promptly isolated for observation, etc.

MARGARET PAUL, age 16.

Examined April 8, 1930, T. 99.5, P. 90, R. 20 -- 4 p.m.

Opinion that this girl has an old (arrested) pulmonary lesion requiring no treatment at present.

ANNIE PENNEL, age 18.

Examined April 7, 1930, T. 99, P. 72, R. 18 -- 4.40 p.m.

No lesion found in chest or glands.

Patient considerably below par mentally.

BARBARA PENNELL, age 16.

Examined April 7, 1930, T. 98, P. 84, R. 18 -- 4.15 p.m.

No chest or gland lesions found.

Patient Feeble Minded.

CHRISTINA PENNELL, Examined April 7, 1930, T. 99, P. 90, R. 20, 3.30 p.m.

No chest lesion found.

Not normal mentally.

VIVIANET PENNELL, age 12.

Examined April 7, 1930, T. 99, P. 80, R. 20 -- 4. p.m.

No lesion found in chest or glands--Definitely Feeble-minded-not capable of acquiring much knowledge.

JOHN PENNELL, age 10.

Examined April 7, 1930, T. 98.2, P. 88, R. 20 -- 3.45 p.m.

No lesion found in chest.

Not bright mentally.

JACK STEVENS, age 10.

Examined April 7, 1930, T. 98.8, P. 72, R. 22 -- 5.45 p.m.

No lesion found in chest.

This boy, although plump, does not look well--Anaemic in appearance. I would suggest that you give him a general physical examination. We would be glad to do any tests you consider necessary at the Provincial Public Health Laboratory: Such as Blood Counts - Kahn - Haemoglobin - Urinary, etc.

SUMMARY

64 cases examined.
 4 positive cases for whom treatment is considered
 1 positive (apparently arrested), for whom treatment
 thought desirable.

 2 glandular cases requiring no special treatment.
 1 questionable case for whom a period of observation

 3 were referred to physician for further examination.
 10 cases were given X-Ray stereoscopic plates.

You will note that four have been recommended for a period of San. treatment and one for observation and study; ages being 14, 13, 12, 10 and 7 years.

At the Nova Scotia Sanatorium they do not take patients under 12 years of age.

I would suggest that an attempt be made to have the younger patients or for that matter, all of them admitted to the Sanatorium at Lourdes in Pictou County, for the summer months. The authorities there might be able to make provision, on the rear balcony, to care for those cases until the autumn at least. If Sanatorium treatment cannot be arranged than the only other alternation, as I see it, is to place the patients on "the cure" in a section of the Shubenacadie School Building. I am not sufficiently familiar with the plan of the building to state whether or not this might be properly done.

I would be strongly opposed to having them sent to their homes.

Ten cases only were X-Rayed and the result surely justified the undertaking.

I would recommend for your serious consideration and for the consideration of the Department of Indian Affairs that all the files be X-Rayed for, as you know, the diagnosis of childhood tuberculosis is a difficult matter and justifies the requisition of every possible aid. It is important that open cases of tuberculosis be eliminated, if at all possible, from the new school. We know the Micmac has been well seeded with the bacilli, hence we should endeavour to prevent the conversion of tuberculous infection to tuberculous disease.

In conclusion permit me to refer to the splendid sanitary environment in which the pupils have been placed. I found them well nourished, spotlessly clean and generally well cared for. It is my opinion that those in charge of the institution have brought knowledge, adaptability and resourcefulness to the work.

He was not able to make immediate arrangements owing to the fact that they cannot accommodate additional inmates but they informed him that they would make an endeavour to do so this week. If not successful in this regard, the Principal intends to keep in touch with Dr. Campbell with a view to having his advice regarding what other institution the children could be placed in.

Immediately upon receipt of the report, arrangements were made to give the treatment recommended by Dr. Campbell for those children who were to remain in the school and they were isolated from the other pupils.

Reverend Sir,-

The Department has read, with interest, Dr. Campbell's report regarding his examination of the children at the Shubenacadie Indian Residential School. It is considered most important in the interests of the health of the others that sanatorium treatment be secured immediately for the four pupils whom Dr. Campbell recommends should receive same. The Department understands that you have already been in communication with the sanatorium at Lourdes and, if you have not yet succeeded in having these four children placed in that institution, I believe that it might be possible to have them placed in the Halifax Tuberculosis Hospital. I trust that you will find it possible to place these children either in the institution mentioned or, if space is not available there, get in touch at once with Dr. Campbell and enlist his co-operation in having them placed.

With reference to the two children who are mentally deficient, the Department has been informed that you are making endeavours to secure accommodation for them in a suitable institution. This action is approved and it is hoped that you will be successful in having them properly cared for.

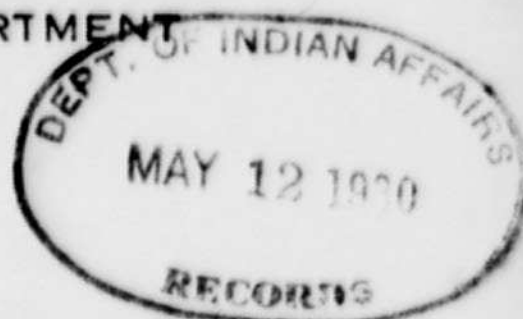
