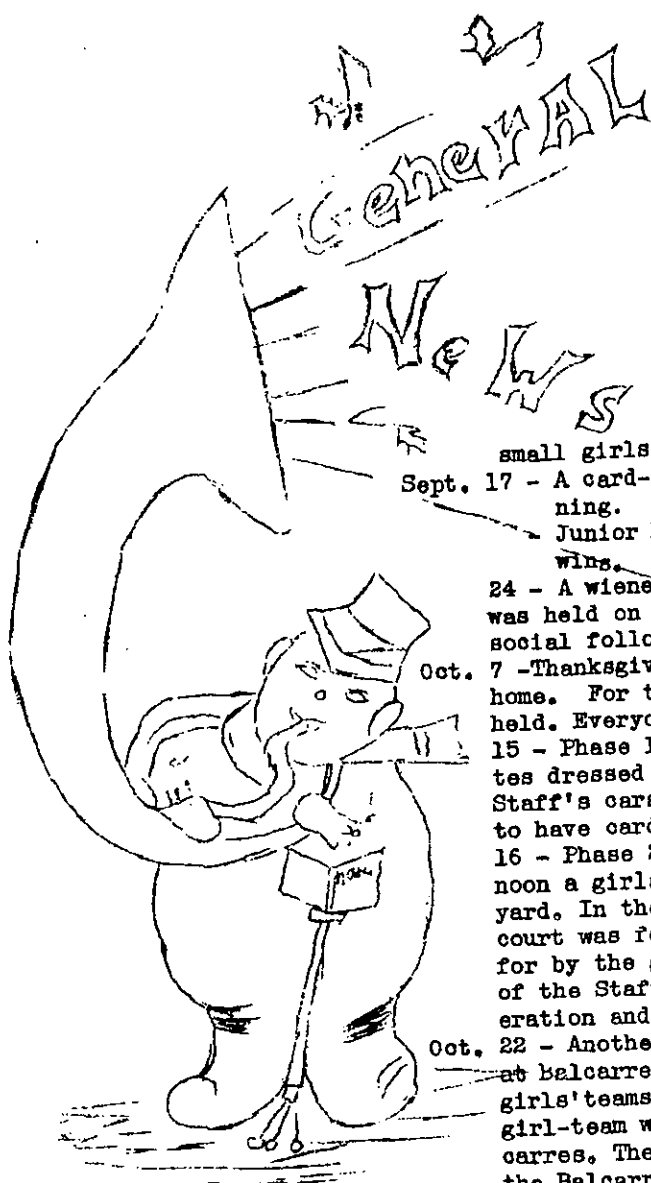
the betterment of the Indian life in every possible field; THINKERS who will plan this evolution and set it up in an operation that will lead to success !!!

- Weekend for those who were able to go home on account of the Teacher's Institute.

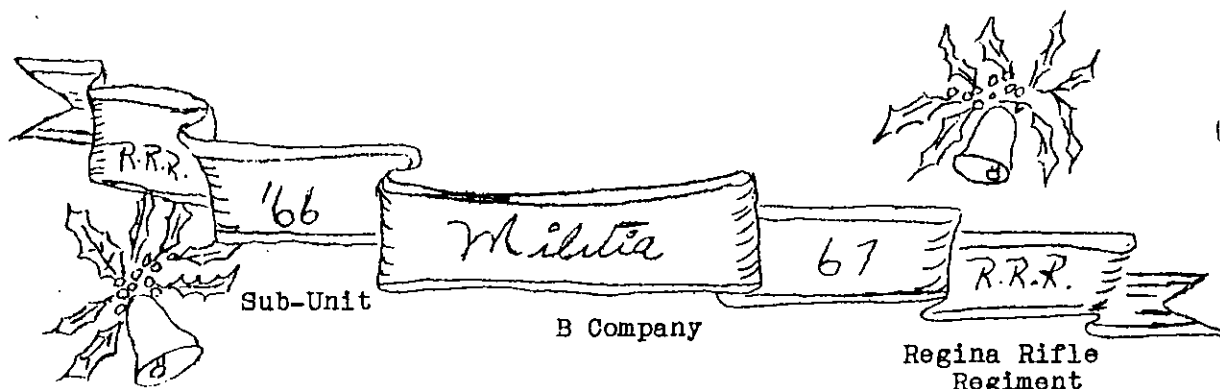
- Eye specialists came to the school. Many need glasses or glasses changed.

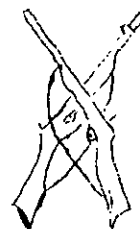
#### CADETS

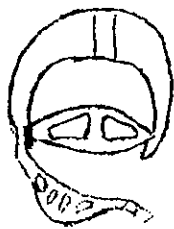

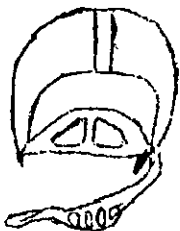

Out of 6 games the boys won 2 and lost 4 to capture third place. In the league semi-finals, St. Paul's eliminated Balcarres in a sudden-death game. Next the boys played a 2 game total point series with Fort Qu'Appelle and lost both games quite handily; 28-19 and then next by 3 T.D's. Below are the St. Paul's games and scores.

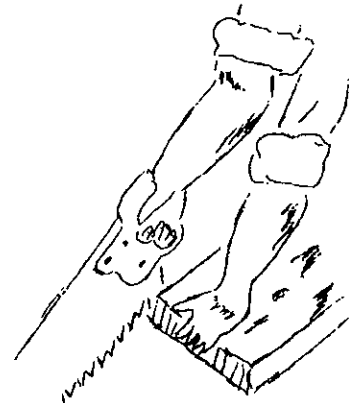
# INDUSTRIAL ARTS

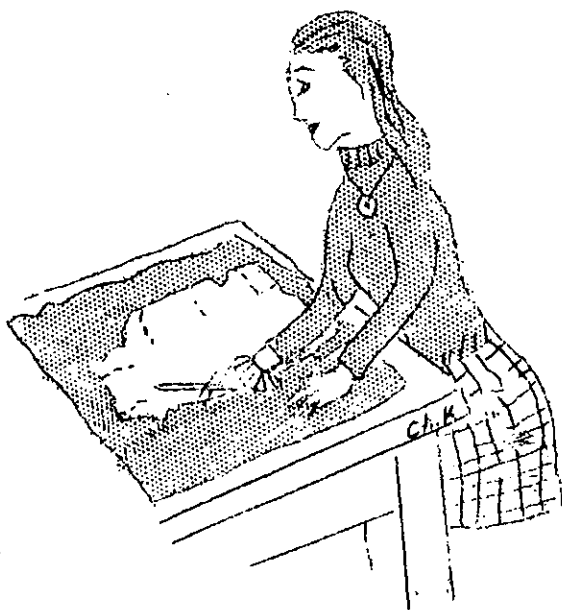

Do You Know,...

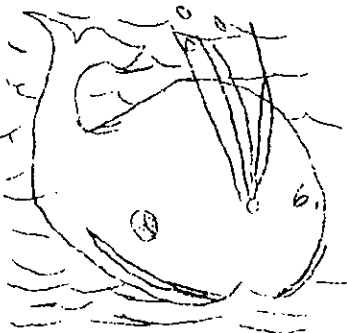


1. Rattle-snakes do not shake rattles to warn its victims? The rattle is caused by the snake's movements.

Whales are the largest living animals. Some have mouths so large, a boat and its crew can float inside.

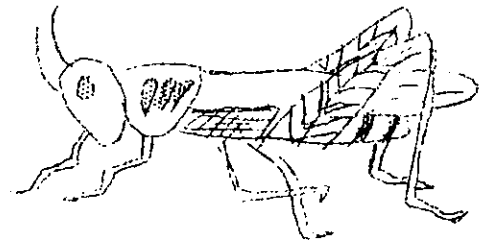
7. The grasshopper is a fiddler. He uses his stiff wings as a fiddle and his hind legs as bows.

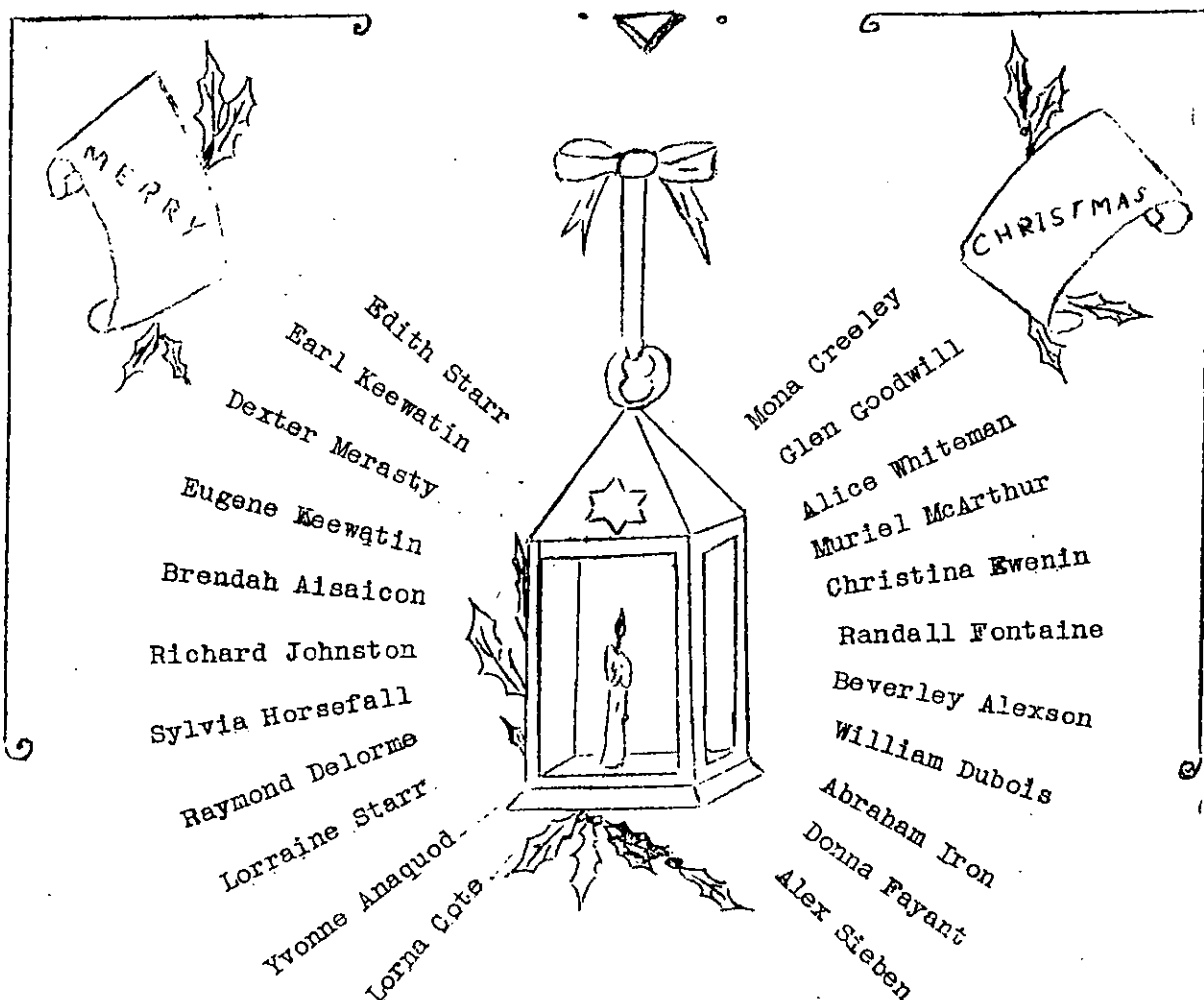

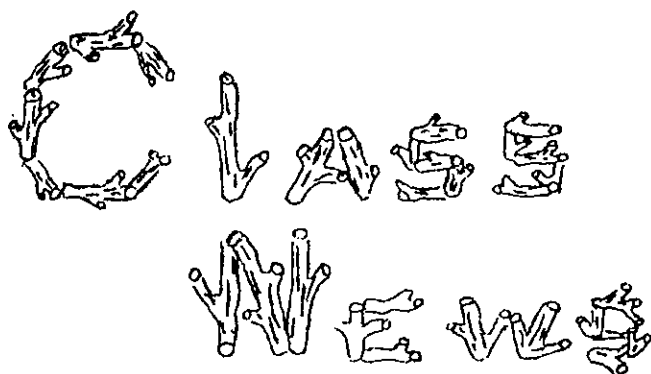


