We acknowledge receipt of your letter containing instructions for wiring The St Georges School at Lytton, B.C,

Re Generating Equipment-

We note you wish to use the gas engine installed at the Laundry, as it will require a 3 Kilowatt generator for this installation which will require the full 6 H.P. of this engine to drive it, This leaves no margin for use in the Laundry and makes it impossible to operate both together,

This being the case it will be necessary to run the engine after the Laundry work is done and well into the night to supply necessary lighting and charge up the batteries, also changing belts every time, and will not be automatic in operation, this last is important in an isolated plant where there is not expert operators, It will also be necessary to enlarge the Building for generator and storage batteries and which will have to be practically Frost proof, This building will cost approximately between two and three hundred dollars, In view of these facts the writer is of the opinion that an Independent Generating Set might be considered, I have ~~del-~~

Sir,—

On inspecting the new barn at St. George's School this morning, I noticed that there are supposed to be braces every eight feet from the floor to the plate. Now these will take away a lot of space from the loft, besides the weight of the hay will come onto them and thus throw the weight onto the sill to which these are attached. Would it not be possible to leave these out altogether, as the way the roof is braced now, there can be no movement whatever? These braces will no doubt take up a lot of space in the barn besides making it very inconvenient to work along the edge.

I also notice that the gable ends have no bracing to prevent them bulging. At the end that the hay is taken in at, hay will bump it and will certainly make it bulge, and the far end when filling the barn, hay will roll against this gable, and will certainly make it bulge without strengthening timbers right across both gable ends.

There was no door allowed in the event of requiring to take any hay out of the loft. There is only one high door at which hay is taken by the derrick fork, so I have had a door put in underneath this one at the floor level.

Everything is going very satisfactorily, and if the steel stanchions, etc., turn up in time, I hope we will be able to occupy it by Christmas.

In connection with the new barn that is being built for the St. George's Indian School at Lytton it will be necessary to provide water at the barn. In erecting this barn the Indian Agent took into consideration the possibility of building a new school in the near future, and the barn is located at a point where there is an ideal site for the building of a new school. This location is approximately a half mile from the old school building.

One of the big difficulties at the present school building is the water supply, and in choosing the new site care was taken to see that a good supply of water could be obtained. At a distance of 2400 feet behind the barn and at an elevation of approximately 175 feet there is an excellent spring, which has been running for many years both winter and summer. This spring will provide all the water that is required for the farm and school on a gravity system. When the new school is built it will be necessary to build a small tank at the source of supply, but for the present I am of the opinion that all that is necessary is to clean out the spring and place a large barrel in same to supply water to the barn. It will be necessary to run a four inch pipe from the spring to the barn, a distance of 2400 feet. This pipe will be large enough to be used later if a new school is built to supply it with water.



When I was at Lytton School the Reverend Principal and the Indian Agent pointed out to me the necessity of providing immediately a small dairy building for use in connection with the barn now being erected.

I advised them that it would be impossible for the Department this year to erect any further buildings, but I explained to the Reverend Principal that if he was willing to perform the necessary labour the Department might consider allowing for the materials required. I asked him to let me have an estimate of the cost of the materials. I have today received a letter from the Indian Agent in which he states that all of the materials required will cost approximately \$200.00. This will provide for a building 16 x 18 feet and will meet their requirements. The principal will, of course, supply all the labour required in the erection of the building.

As it is necessary that they have this building to carry on their work I beg to recommend that the Indian Agent be authorized to purchase the necessary materials.

Sir,—

We have been waiting patiently to hear from you since you left, in regard to the installing of the water system for the new barn at St. George's School.

I wrote you so that you would get the letter on your return to Ottawa, about December 1st, but have had no reply.

I now beg to confirm the following night-lettergram just sent you.

"Kindly advise me what arrangements have been made about putting in water to the new barn at St. George's School. Frost will soon make it difficult to dig trench, and it is essential to have water at the barn, Wire instructions."

As you can realize if this trench is not dug before the frost gets in too deep, it will cost considerably more. The barn should be ready for use by the new year, and it is very essential that there should be water laid on for the use of the stock.

Dear Sir:-

I beg to confirm telegram sent you as follows:

"Can you undertake wiring Lytton School on cost plus ten percent basis wire me Vancouver Hotel".

and your reply:

"Will take job at Lytton on terms stated".

and my wire to you,

"Proceed to Lytton School and consult with Indian Agent Graham re wiring Lytton School" Letter following addressed to Lytton care of Graham".

It is proposed to wire the school in an exposed conduit system of wiring, and supplying only the lights absolutely necessary to light the building. All of the lights to be installed to be operated by drop-lights and no switches. There is at present located in the laundry gasoline engine which it is proposed to use for operating the dynamo. This dynamo should be 110 volt and capable of supplying current to 75% of all lights installed. It will also be necessary to install a storage battery 56 cells capable of supplying light to 75% of the lights for 8 hours with generator not running, the battery to be as manufactured by the Hart Battery Manufacturing Company. There also will be required the regular switch-board. You will notice that a portion of this building is already wired for electric lights, this wiring, however, was installed some time ago and I do not think is in a safe condition - new conduit wiring should therefore be run in the building.
